# TOURISTS MAKE BUSINESS FOR SOUTHERN CITY

Victoria Estimates Five Million Dollars Secured There Through Visitors

VICTORIA, Feb. 9. — Just what benefit the tourist business is to any city is explained in the annual report of the Victoria and Island Publicity Bureau presented at the meeting of the directors here. The whole of Canada recognizes and bids for tourists' business, the report points out, and it is estimated that over 85,000,000 was left in Victoria by tourists last year. The report says: "Tourist development is now recognized as a very valuable one throughout Canada. It is estimated that 355,000 people visited this city during the year 1925. If each of these visitors averaged \$15 expenditure in this city it would mean that over five and a quarter million dollars of outside money was left here. One hotel in this city, which showed 50,000 registrations in 1924, had 65,000 registrations last year. One of the small restaurants in this city during the ninety days period of last year served 45,000 meals, most, or all, of which were to tourists."

**Notable Examples**  
The tourist industry made Switzerland and Florida, and is largely responsible for California's growth. Large Eastern Canadian organizations report the tourist business to be one of the great producers of wealth in Ontario. The tourist exchanges his money for scenery, food, shelter, pleasure and amusement, and it has been stated that the principal beneficiaries of tourist traffic are the hotels and restaurants, which is a great fallacy. # FAMOUS DOGS GO TO QUEBEC

Taken East in Special Car on Canadian National from The Pas

WINNIPEG, Feb. 9.—Claimed by their drivers to be the fastest in the world, twenty-five northern Manitoba dogs occupied a special express car on Canada's National train number Two leaving here for the east. The famous dogs with their famous drivers, Emile St. Goddard, Shorty Russick and W. Grayson of The Pas will take part in the international Derby to be run at Quebec on February 18-19 and 20. St. Goddard's dogs broke the world record in the recent dog Derby at The Pas making 26 miles in two hours and 22 minutes as compared with the previous world record at 25 miles in the same time.

The teams which rested at the Canadian National Express stables over the week end to break the journey from northern Manitoba to Quebec, were the centre of much interest here. Crowds of people visited the stables yesterday to get a glimpse of the world famous dogs. An invitation has been extended to drivers to give an exhibition of races at Toronto, and also to take their teams to the New England Derby in New Hampshire, following the Quebec races. Whether they will do this or not will be decided on the result of the next Derby.

# GRAIN ROLLING FROM EDMONTON

Seventeen Million Bushels Shipped this Season from Alberta Capital to Vancouver

EDMONTON, Feb. 9. — Over 17,000,000 bushels of grain have been shipped from Edmonton to Vancouver this season, according to official figures of inspections that have been issued from the office of S. Thompson, dominion inspector. This constitutes a record and fully establishes this point as one of the big grain shipping centres of Canada.

During January alone a total of 5,120,000 bushels were inspected here. Inclusive of shipments from the dominion elevator, the amount consigned to Vancouver over the C.N.R. was 5,613,100 bushels.

During the last few days the movement has slackened somewhat, but it is expected to show a spurt shortly. On Tuesday there were 60 cars taken in at the dominion elevator while 57 cars were loaded for Vancouver. There is space there for 1,500,000 bushels or more, so the plant is in good shape for a rush now.

**Embargo was Lifted**  
Recently the C.N.R. lifted the embargo on tough grain consigned to the Edmonton elevator, so this may speed up shipments. As has been the case for some time, only dried grain or straight grades are being moved to the coast under the permit system.

# STUDY IN PRICES OF SHIPPING GRAIN FROM PRAIRIE TO SEABOARD

(Edmonton Bulletin)  
The first cargo of wheat to clear that port in a year left Halifax a few days ago. It comprised 260,000 bushels.

If that wheat was grown in the Edmonton district, it cost 15.6 cents per bushel to take it to Fort William. The winter rate from that point to Liverpool is 33 cents per bushel. The total carrying charges from Edmonton to Liverpool would be 48.6 cents per bushel.

Shipped westward, the rate to Vancouver would be 42.6 cents per bushel, and 22 cents per bushel from Vancouver to Liverpool; a total freightage of 34.6 cents per bushel.

The difference in saving of 14 cents per bushel in favor of the Pacific route. On a cargo of that size the growers in central Alberta would lose just \$36,400 because the wheat went east instead of west.
