Stable Government Insured for Several Years as Result of Election Yesterday in Which Meighen Defeated

MINISTERS FAIL OF RE-ELECTION

Premier Must Resign and Give Place to Mackenzie King Following Clear Verdict Yesterday

OTTAWA. Sept. 15 .- The Meighen Government was defeated at the polis vesterday and the Liberal party and its allies are again triumphant. Returns at present available do not indicate whether the Liberal party will have a cleat majority over all others, but such seems probable. Counting the Liberal-Progressives and the Independent Liberals, there will be a majority large enough to insure stable government for the next few years.

Premier Meighen himself and five of his ministers went down to defeat, and It is thought the Premier will tender his resignation at once and Mackenzie King

"There is no doubt in the world. said Mr. Stork, "that the outlook for Prince Rupert was better than at any time in the last fifteen years, but the people decided to oppose Mackenzie King the only man who has done anything whatever to develop the city."

Mr. Stork expressed the opinion that Prince Rupert will not improve her position by the action taken yesterday, but he desired the Daily News to to express his appreciation for the loyal support given him throughout Skeens by friends and adherents who believe in the policie of Mackenzie King.


PREPARATIONS MADE FOR RESIGNA-TION OF CABINET.-COALITION IS SUGGESTED.

Mr. Meighen was at the office this morning but had nothing to say. It is expected the cabinet will be summoned early and preparations made for placing their resignations in the hands of the Governor

As the results stood this afternoon, Mr. King falls short of a clear Liberal majority, requiring at least 124 members but in the normal course of events a Liberal-Progressive cabinet would carry with it 18 Progressives and Liberal-Progressives elected yesterday and already there is talk of a Liberal-Progressive coalition.
