

# QUEEN MARIE AT WINNIPEG

### EXPRESSES THANKS FOR SERVICES ON NATIONAL LINE AND SIGNS HOTEL REGISTER

WINNIPEG, Nov. 1.—Previous to her departure from the prairie capital Queen Marie, of Roumania, sent a telegram to Sir Henry W. Thornton, chairman and President of the Canadian National Railways, in these terms: "For nearly five days we have been travelling over your wonderful railroad and I have been able to gain some knowledge of the extraordinary railroad system over which you preside. I want you to believe me that I do not undervalue anything that has been done for myself and my entourage."

"I have dealt sufficiently with railroads in Roumania to realize the technical difficulties and inconvenience to your traffic in running a special train. I realize that while we are sleeping and travelling in luxury, thousands of men throughout your system have been in every way guarding the track and protecting our safety. Were it possible, I would like to thank in person each and every one and through you I hope my thanks may be given to those unseen friends who have rendered me day and night their anonymous services."

"I want particularly to commend the dining car service for in your standard dining car I invited my entourage and friends to be my luncheon guests on my birthday, and last but not least, I must express my gratitude for the wonderful protection accorded by the railroad police. Signed 'Marie'."

### QUEEN SIGNED REGISTER

They are very proud today at the Fort Garry. Many distinguished guests have visited the delightful hotel but yesterday for the first time a reigning queen graced it by her presence.

When Queen Marie, of Roumania, entered the hotel she agreed that she must follow the procedure of other travellers, so she signed her name on the register and their royal highnesses followed the example of their royal mother.

"Marie" in bold strong strokes, heads the register sheet, and that is followed by "Irene" in hardly less bold style, suggesting some of her mother's traits, while "Nicholas" suggests character of his own.

The register sheet was promptly withdrawn from service and hereafter suitably framed will form one of the treasures of the Fort Garry.

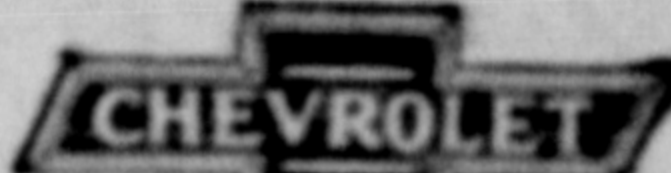
