Sherbrooke Ave. Construction To be Revived at Next Meeting

A move by Alderman Darrow Gomez to have city council commit itself regarding construction of Sherbrooke Avenue at a cost of \$15,000 to the city and \$10,000 to the property owners concerned has been laid over until the next meeting.

After lengthy discussion on the subject, it was disclosed that council had approved a motion last year to look into the cost and had turned over the proposition to the works committee.

Somehow, the motion became side-tracked.

Ald. Gomez asked at the last council meeting why the work had not been done and last night the works committee reported its predicament.

Ald. Ray McLean, who was not on council at the time the motion was advanced, asked time to look over the site before he could vote or comment and on suggestion of Ald. George Casey the matter was laid over to give all members of the council a chance to re-familiarize themselves with the project.

READY TO TALK WAGES
City Clerk Bill Long was instructed by council last night to advise various trade unions that the city is now prepared to discuss wage and working conditions for 1953.

International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers already has advised council it is prepared to discuss the 1953 contract.

Council endorsed a resolution appointing Alderman Mike Krueger and George Casey to serve with Mayor Harold Whalen as a Court of Revision for the 1952-53 voters list.

AUDITOR RETURNS
Scott McLaren, city auditor, has returned from Vancouver where he discussed the city's brief objecting to increased bus fares here with the Public Utilities Commission. No decision was made at the meeting.

City Clerk Bill Long, in answer to a question by Ald. Ray McLean, said a housing commission will be appointed here to administer the homes now being constructed by Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

Ald. McLean wanted to know if the city would select the tenants and collect rents.

A request by P. H. Linzey on behalf of former commissioner A. J. Alder for permission to remodel the latter's building on

Third Avenue was laid over until the mayor and aldermen inspect the premises. A time will be arranged for city fathers to visit the building in a body. Mr. Linzey said the owner suggested modernizing the front and renting it for a warehouse.

Registration of Householders and Licenseholders for the Municipal Voters' List closes at 5 P.M. OCTOBER 31st, 1952.

Voters who have previously registered in either of these capacities and who have paid Poll Tax or Trades License fees for the current year do not need to re-register.

New licenseholders or payers of Poll Tax should register at the City Hall between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. Mondays through Fridays.

All registrants must be British Subjects of the full age of 21 years, and in the case of Poll Tax payers must have resided in Prince Rupert continuously since January 1st, 1952.

For the added convenience of new Registrants, the office of the City Clerk will be kept open between 7 p.m. and 9 p.m. on Tuesday, October 28th, Wednesday October 29th, and Thursday October 30th.
