

ASCOT RACES THIS WEEK

Notables Will Gather From all Over Country to Watch Dozen Events

LONDON, June 15—(Canadian Press).—This week comes the annual pageant of Royal Ascot—one of the most brilliantly social turf meetings in the world. Notables will gather from all over the kingdom to watch the turf's finest horses clash in a dozen of the season's most important races, scattered through the four days' program.

From June 15 to 18 inclusive, these are the races that will centre the kingdom's attention on the beautiful race course on Ascot Heath: Coventry Stakes, two-year-old colts; Queen Mary Stakes, two-year-old fillies; Prince of Wales Stakes, three-year-olds; Coronation Stakes, three-year-old fillies; Gold Vase, Gold Cup, Ascot Stakes, Royal Hunt Cup and the New Stakes, the latter for two-year-olds.

Colorado vs. Coronach
A feature making the meet next week even more interesting than usual to the turfgoer is the possibility of a meeting on even terms between Lord Derby's beautiful small colt Coronach, winner of the season's first classic, the Two Thousand Guineas, and Lord Woolavington's Coronach, winner of the Epsom Derby. Colorado defeated Coronach by five lengths in the Guineas; Coronach came back and in the mud and rain of Epsom won the great race by five lengths from Lance Gaye, who was a short head in front of Colorado. On the outcome of the races at Ascot may depend the favorite for the fifth and last of the season's three-year-old classics, the Doncaster St. Leger in September.

The races in which both Coronach and Colorado are entered at Ascot are the St. James' Palace Stakes and the Hardwicke Stakes. The first has a prize of 1,000 sovereigns added to stakes of 100 sovereigns each, and is run over the Old Mile on the first day. The Hardwicke Stakes, established in 1879, carries 2,000 sovereigns added to sweepstakes of 10 sovereigns each, and is a mile and a half, run on the last day of the meeting.

The plentifulness of rich and long-established races has been one of the main factors in establishing the prestige of Royal Ascot, where victory stamps a horse with the seal of worth. The Gold Vase was run in 1838; the Ascot Stakes in 1839; the Royal Hunt Cup was instituted in 1843; the Ascot Gold Cup has been run since 1807, and the New Stakes was first run in 1843.

Derby Chased
Last season Sir John Rutherford's colt Solario defeated the Derby winner Manna, in the Ascot Derby Stakes, and went on to win the St. Leger, again defeating Manna. This year the Ascot Derby Stakes is renamed the King Edward VII. Stakes, though the conditions and the distance, one and half miles, have not been changed. Colorado and 65 other high class three-year-olds are entered, but Coronach is not.

The Royal Hunt Cup and the Gold Cup are outstanding for their value. The first is a handicap of a little more than seven furlongs and much coveted. It was won last year by P. N. Elk's Cockpit. The Gold Cup is the turf's longest and hardest race on the flat, being of a distance of two and a half miles, but the prize mounts closely to \$20,000. The Gold Cup and the Gold Vase together make one of the turf's most popular "doubles." Last year's winner of the Cup, Barclay Walker's Santorh, is again entered. Another interesting entrant is A. B. Cox's Picaroon who was the hot favorite for the Derby last year, until withdrawn from training after a mishap. Manna, last year's Derby and Two Thousand Guineas winner has been retired to stud, but Solario, winner of the St. Leger, will race in the Gold Cup.

STREET WORK IS DISCUSSED

Summit Avenue Residents Ask For Roadway—Reference Made to Financial Aspects

The city council engaged last night in considerable discussion of the year's program of road work with particular reference to the financial aspects.

E. A. Mann, on behalf of property owners on Summit Avenue, appeared before the council to ask if it was proposed to do anything in the matter of opening up that street. It had been just twelve years ago, Mr. Mann said, when the council had first approached on this question and at that time assurance was given that there would be no difficulty in having the roadway provided. However, financial difficulty had arisen as it was proposed to assess the property owners on one side of the street for the whole cost while the other side, bounded with a city reserve, went free. The residents, Mr. Mann said, were willing to pay their full share but they felt that it was unfair to be asked to bear the whole cost. All they asked was that the council give the question their earnest consideration and give them a fair deal. They felt that they were deserving of some measure of relief and that a roadway on Summit Avenue was perhaps more necessary than on other streets where such roads had already been provided. The cost as far as the city was concerned he understood would not be excessive, amounting to only some \$700 or \$800.

Mayor Newton assumed the blame for action with respect to Summit Avenue having been delayed this year. The board of works had decided to go on with the work but, at his suggestion, the project had been delayed until more money was available which would only be a matter of a few weeks until the year's taxes started to come in. Already, for a similar financial reason, the

board of works had been compelled to shut down other road work temporarily. There was no intention to unduly delay the carrying out of the work.

Ald. Stephens While being in no way opposed to the project in question and fully realizing the merit of the claim of the Summit Avenue residents for a roadway, Ald. Stephens felt that, instead of making promises, it was time for the council to take stock of its resources. Before promising to do new work that was not provided for in the estimates, he felt that the council should ascertain if it could carry out the work already provided for. Otherwise, there was a real danger of having a serious deficit at the end of the year. From the point of view of sound business, he did not think the council was in a position to handle the Summit Avenue work this year. Even if the work were to be done under the local improvement plan, the city as a whole would have to bear a considerable portion of the cost saying nothing of property that might revert to the city through the increased taxation. If his memory served him right, not a dollar had been placed in estimates this year to take care of the city's share of local improvement bylaws.

Later in the meeting, Ald. Jos. Carver inquired from Ald. Perry as to when it might be expected that Fourth Avenue East and Seventh Avenue West, grading would be completed. It was desirable he felt that the work be completed as soon as possible so that the exact cost might be ascertained and the bonds sold without carrying the cost from general fund into next year's business. In reply, Ald. Perry stated that it was expected to have the two streets referred to completed by August 1 and then start on Jordan Street and Summit Avenue.
