

Dr. West Testifies

Dr. J. A. West was the next; He stated he had been ogy on and off for years mostly in London, England, and later in Prince Rupert. He had been! called in by the Provincial police authorities in this case to carryl

out certain analysis of stains on clothing. On May 31 he had been handed several articles by the police and again on June 2 Since then he had been examining the stains. The pair of shoes belonging to prisoner had! been examined by him but the blood stains were negligible. The stains on the cotton button band of the woollen shirt had been examined and were found to be blood from which only crystals were obtained, further experiment being necessary. Several pieces of cloth containing stains had been taken from the coat by in court was identified. #### Identified Wooden Post

Inspector Spiller was again called to the witness box to didentify a piece of 4 x 4 wood found near the scene of the tragedy. This piece of wood had been found at a point which showed signs of a struggle and considerable blood. Doctor West said he had not been able in his investigations to distinguish to which class the blood stains belonged. Mr. Patmore. "Here in British Columbia. what are the main blood groupings-two or four?" Dr. West. We have such a mixed population I do not know whether they have been tabulated." Ques-i tioned as to the stains found only accused's trousers Dr. West said! that two patches examined had! the given a definite re-action for human blood. Asked if he had found any human blood stains on the shirt, Dr. West stated! there had been a faint re-action for human blood. These patches had been examined twicel and gave a re-action both times. This concluded the evidence for the preliminary trial and Sankey! was formally committed by the
