# FORESTRY LECTURE WAS INTERESTING

About 150 People Heard Illustrated Talk Last Evening

A lecture on the forestry resources of the province and forest fire problems was given in the Booth School last night by Angus Cooch, in charge of the lecture tour of the Canadian Forestry Association, assisted by Mr. Jeffrey, in charge of the forestry car of the association. About 150 people, mostly children, attended the lecture and evinced much interest in the talk given with the aid of motion pictures. The special forestry demonstration car went east this morning to engage in a tree planting campaign on the prairies. For the past seven or eight years experiments have been made by the forestry department with the seedlings of various species of trees as a means of establishing plantations to act as wind breaks and wood lots and general improvements.

# JAPAN WOULD HAVE HER OWN CHRISTIANITY

It Should Perfectly Harmonize With National Characteristics Along With Other Religions

OSAKA, June 16.—If Japan expects to absorb the benefits of Western civilization, "it will be necessary for her to welcome Christianity with open arms and harmonize the religion of the West and the national characteristics of the Eastern Empire," in the opinion of the Osaka "Mainichi."

This newspaper's editorial on the subject, which attracted considerable attention, said it "is indeed a great mistake to think that Western culture grew up quite independent of its religion, just as it is absurd to think that Eastern culture is independent of its religious thought or feeling. "Strange to say, the majority of Japanese seem to think that we can very well absorb Western culture without paying any heed to its religion—Christianity. It is our humble opinion that in order to fulfill the heaven-sent mission, if such it be, of welding the Oriental and Occidental civilizations into one, it is almost incumbent upon us Japanese to welcome Christianity with open arms, so as to be able to make that religion our own, just as we did Buddhism and Confucianism in the past.

### Know Doctrines

"To welcome Christianity means not necessarily to make this country a so-called Christendom, but it means that the nation as a whole should become conversant—in Christian doctrines and sentiment in a similar degree as Western peoples who confess that religion.

"Japan should have her own Christianity perfectly harmonized with her national characteristics, and so well assimilated as to make it her own religion, side by side with her inherited spiritual cults, such as Buddhism, Confucianism and Shintoism."

# FISH FROZEN COME TO LIFE

Blackfish of Alaska Exported in Blocks of Ice and Alive When Thawed Out

CHICAGO, June 16.—The possibility of transporting Alaskan blackfish to Chicago by freezing them into solid blocks, and then bringing them back to life by thawing the ice, is being investigated by Walter H. Chute, associate director of the \$2,000,000 Shedd aquarium to be erected in Grant park.

Preliminary investigation has determined that the Alaskan blackfish, principal food of the natives living between Yukon delta and the Kuskokwim river, has tremendous vitality, and is as lively as ever when thawed out after weeks in their icy prisons.

### Swallowed by Dogs

Cases have been reported where frozen fish have come back to life after being swallowed by native dogs. In these instances the fish were thawed out by the animal heat of the stomachs, their movements causing the dogs to vomit them up alive.

This species is probably the most abundant of all fishes which occur in the fresh and brackish waters of the northern part of Alaska. It is found in all small streams of the low grounds, in the wet morasses and sphagnum-covered areas, which are soaked with water and which at times seem to contain water sufficient only to moisten the skin.

In the low grounds or tundra are thousands of small ponds of sevy slight depth, connected with each other by small streams of variable width. These narrow outlets of the ponds are at certain seasons so full of fish that they completely block them up.

### Captured in Traps

The natives capture them by the use of small traps. The fish are placed in grass baskets where they quickly freeze and then are put on stages to keep them out of reach of the dogs.

When brought into the house, after weeks on the stages the fish thaw out and wiggle around apparently unharmed.

While their numbers are so vast as to enable whole settlements to subsist this species, which is the sole representative of a family and order of fishes, is rare in museums and collections in general. The body is rather long, the pectorals are about half as long as the head, the eye is rather small, the mouth is moderately large, the lower jaw projects like that of an aged trout, the back fins are short and without spines, and the tail is rounded, with many slender rays. In color it is mottled brownish black. The fish resembles the pike or small pickerel.
