### IMMIGRANTS ARRIVE ON CANADIAN PRAIRIES

WINNIPEG, Nov. 24.—A party of 93 immigrants, passengers from the SS. Regina which docked at Quebec November 21, arrived in Winnipeg over the Canadian National lines. There were representatives from fourteen different nations on board with the largest group being British with a total of 40. The party consisted of the following: Austrians 1, British 40, Czechoslovakians 2, Finns 6, French 1, Germans 7, Hebrews 1, Norwegians 3, Poles 10, Russians 5, Swedes 2, Syrian 1, Ukrainians 13.

Ten of the party are destined for Manitoba, twenty four for Saskatchewan, twenty seven for Alberta and for British Columbia, 32 of which 25 are for Vancouver.

### ALICE ARM

Twenty-five men are being employed at F. L. Housley's logging camp on the Kitsault flats and, since operations commenced in the spring, three million feet of logs have been taken off. Logging up to the present time has been carried on on the north end of the flats but a 100 foot bridge is being built across the northeast fork of the Kitsault River to give access to the other side of the stream which will now be logged. The logs will be delivered to the Powell River paper mill.

The Success property, which lies about two miles from Alice Arm on the west, is being developed by the owners, W. A. Wilson, J. Peacock, J. A. Wilson and J. A. McDermaid. A tunnel has been driven into a four foot vein of good looking silver ore which has been traced for 500 feet. It is the intention of the owners to continue work throughout the winter.

Gus Strombeck has left for Vancouver where he will spend the winter months, returning to Alice Arm in the spring.

John Thomas, who was injured some time ago in the Housley logging camp, has returned to town from Anyox Hospital but it will be some time before he will be able to return to work.
