Mrs. Anna Ross was in communication with the city council last night complaining that, in the winter, water from Third Avenue drained into the basement of the Empress Hotel making it necessary to wear gum boots to enter the basement and sometimes putting the furnace fire out. Mrs. Ross asked that the city do something to rectify the matter and her letter was referred to the Board of Works with power to act.

A letter from the Prince Rupert Board of Trade requesting the co-operation of the city in staging a celebration on the arrival of the first ship here to load grain was received by the council last night and a motion by Ald. Jos. Greer and Ald. Brown that a committee from the council be appointed for the purpose was carried. Mayor Newton appointed Ald. Casey, Ald. Stephens, Ald. Jos. Greer and himself as the committee with power to act.

Stating that a complaint had been made to him that a street light had been moved from Seventh Avenue West to Fulton Street for the benefit of Chinamen, Ald. Casey inquired at last night's council meeting as to the reason for moving said light. J. J. Little, superintendent of utilities, stated that it had been moved to illuminate a "dark hole" on Fulton Street and now both sides of the street were lightened instead of only one. He stated, however, that it would not be very costly to instal another. The matter was left for the attention of the utilities committee.

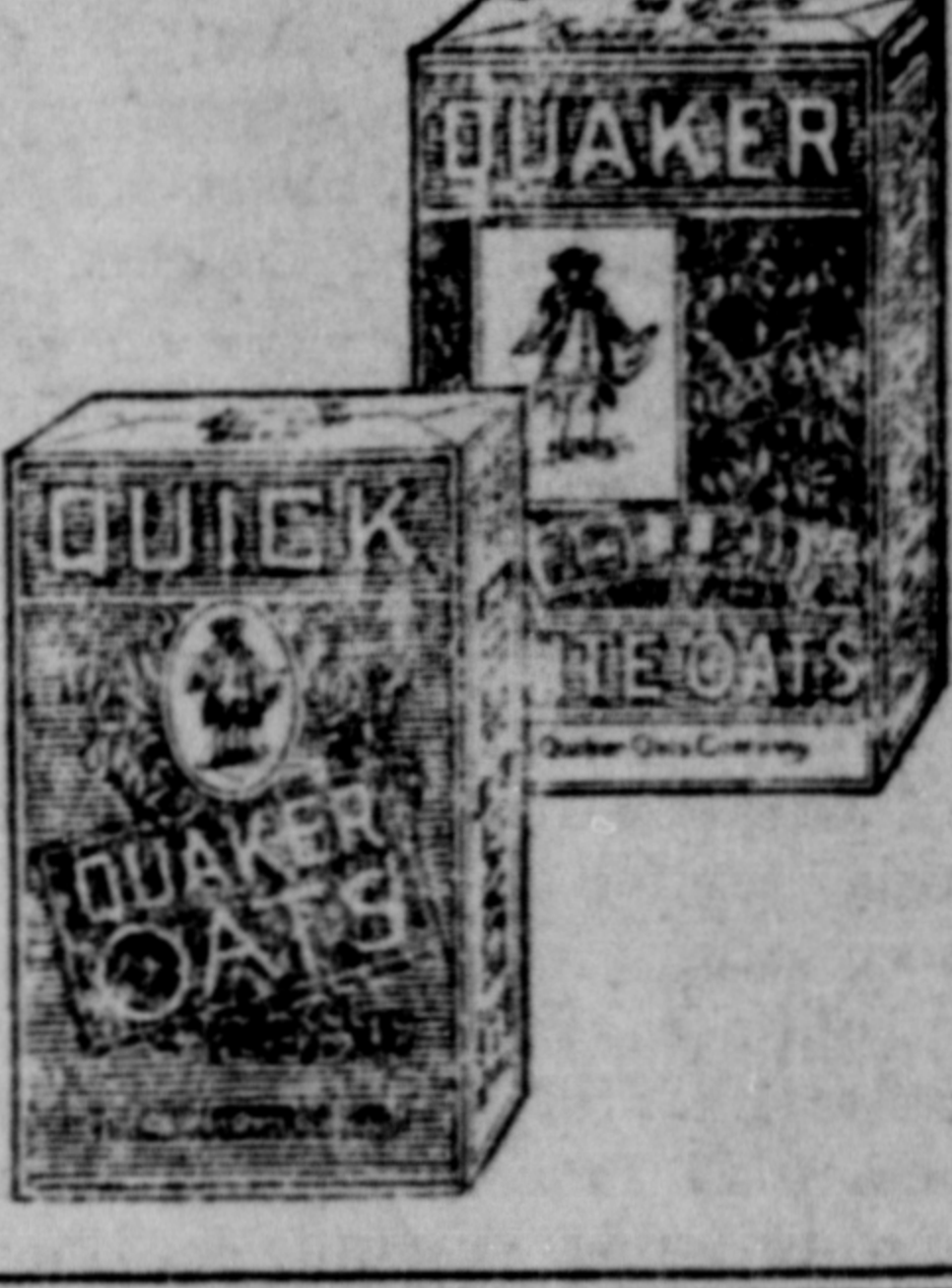
