Man Freed by Wolves but Frightened Them with Burning Fagots  
WINNIPEG, Dec. 1.—"Some people think that the buckskin jackets worn by trappers are more ornament than use, but I am willing to announce that they have another think coming," says "Big Bill" Baines, Blackwater River trapper who was in the city recently.  
Crossing a barren stretch of muskog in northern British Columbia, says Bill, he shot away all his shells at an elusive silver fox. However he was near to his cabin and he did not worry although it was rapidly getting dark.  
He was hurrying along, when suddenly behind him an outburst of quavering, blood-curdling cries from a band of timber wolves brought him to guard. Baines took to his legs and so did the wolves. The only thing in sight that seemed to offer a chance of escape was a single tamarack tree. Up this Bill climbed, perching himself on one of the dead limbs.  
The wolves arrived at the foot of the tree only a few moments behind the trapper. Uttering threatening howls, the more ferocious members of the band strove desperately to climb the tree, pawing vainly at the trunk, while saliva dripped from their jaws and their eyes glared balefully in the dusk.  
It was bitterly cold and the wolves refused to budge. Cutting the fringes from his jacket he knotted them together, than he broke off dead twigs and fastened them into bundles with the buckskin thongs. Setting fire to the fagots, he dropped them amidst the wolves. Stricken with fear, the animals dashed wildly away. Bill gave them a good start but found himself unable to catch them.

**URGES ASSISTANCE NATIVE CANADIANS**  
If Immigrants to be Placed on Farms Those Born in Country Should also Have Chance  
EDMONTON, Nov. 30.—That if any governmental assistance is to be given immigrants coming into Canada, a similar measure of assistance should be granted native Canadians who want to go on the land, was the opinion expressed by Hon. Herbert Greenfield, provincial government colonization expert, in an address to the Canadian club on Wednesday. In submitting this view and in the course of his whole address, Mr. Greenfield was careful to point out, however, he was giving expression to his own thoughts only, and in no wise speaking for the Alberta government.  
Canadian cities are full of people with the urge to "go farming," whose only reason for not following their natural bent is lack of capital. Mr. Greenfield declared. No fewer than ten such persons, heads of families, had come to him within the last few weeks to solicit aid toward their establishment on the land.  
Granting of assistance to people of this sort would have the double benefit of relieving the labor situation and making room in urban centres for non-agricultural immigrants.  
An aggressive national policy of immigration and a co-ordination of effort among public organizations, looking to the "thickening up" of partially settled rural areas was the big idea of today, Mr. Greenfield said. Careful selection of immigrants, long-term amortization and the forming of non-profit-making organizations to advise and assist the settler were keystones in the solution of the immigrant problem.  
Plenty of good settlers were available in Great Britain, the United States and European countries, Mr. Greenfield had found. Financing of their establishment was the greatest problem.

A number of toasts and speeches were made during the evening and many were the expressions of regret at the loss of a popular and active member but all extended their best wishes for his success in his future home.
