

SHIPPING GRAIN THROUGH U. S.

Halifax Man Urges That Canadian Ports Be Used in Preference to American.

EDUCATE THE PEOPLE

Financial Gain of the Country at Large Would Follow if U. S. Ports Not Used.

VANCOUVER, July 16.—A strong plea that as a patriotic duty Canadian grain and Canadian products generally should be shipped through the ports of the maritime provinces was made before the convention of the Canadian Credit Men's Association here by E. J. Murphy, of Halifax, N. S.

Mr. Murphy referred to the transportation problems that have faced different sections of the Dominion and to the enormous expenditures made with a view to solving some of these problems through utilization of the maritime ports.

Rates the Same
"Yet," he added, "notwithstanding the fact that export rates through Canadian Atlantic ports are exactly the same as through American Atlantic ports, what do we find? This year out of an estimated export of 330,000,000 bushels of grain, not less than 180,000,000 bushels will probably go through American ports, 80,000,000 through the port of Vancouver, 60,000,000 through the port of Montreal and probably less than 12,000,000 through the maritime ports of Halifax and St. John, though both of them are well equipped with grain handling facilities.

Mr. Murphy referred to the fact that the Grand Trunk, now absorbed in the Canadian National, had for years made Portland, Maine, its winter port for Canadian business. It was true that the distance was shorter and it cost the railway less to haul their freight, but another fact must not be lost sight of—the fact that all the employees of a Canadian railway spent their earnings in an American port and the boats loaded with Canadian freight paid harbor dues to American officials.

Complete Cargo
"It is even a fact," he continued, "that within the last few weeks steamers, loaded mainly with Canadian grain have called at Halifax on the route across the Atlantic to complete a small portion of their cargo. Are you surprised that we sometimes lose patience and express indignation in rather forcible language?"

"It seems peculiar that the railways contend that there is no money for them in handling grain. When the annual statements are issued, the profit-producing months are, as a rule, the months in which the bulk of the grain is moved by them."

Mr. Murphy concluded by stating that he had been told that the railways had no control over the routing of the grain and that they were obliged to carry it as routed.

Vancouver Enterprise
"If such is the case," he said, "a campaign is in order to educate Canadians to be patriotic and to assist one another by co-operating as far as possible in using the ports of Canada for the financial gain, not merely of these ports, but of the country at large."

The speaker complimented the people of Vancouver on the enterprise shown in the advancement of their port and said that the people of the maritimes were not envious but merely desirous of obtaining fair treatment.

FORMAL ANNOUNCEMENT RIGHT TO FISH BAIT

Alaskans Now May Get Order Allowing Herring to be Taken and Stored for Halibut Fishing

KETCHIKAN, July 16.—Modification of the Alaska fisheries law to permit the taking of bait during closed seasons, approved recently by congress, was officially announced in Ketchikan, through a bulletin from Stephen Davis, acting secretary of commerce.

The only change in the existing provisions of the law is the insertion of the clause: "Provided further, that the secretary of commerce is hereby authorized to permit the taking of fish or shellfish, for bait purposes only, at any or all seasons in any or all Alaskan territorial waters."

This modification enables the promulgation of regulations liberalizing conditions under which halibut fishermen may secure herring for bait at times when commercial fishing for herring for other purposes is prohibited.

Davis' announcement also included an amendment to Regulations No. 3 for the Southeastern Alaskan area stipulating that the closed season for commercial fishing shall not apply to the taking of herring for bait purposes in waters otherwise open to fishing.

At the opening of the present halibut season fishing was retarded somewhat because of the lack of herring bait. The new provision will permit the catching and storing of herring for bait in preparation for the opening of the season.


