Pleasure boat season opening---herring seining about over though run is still on---spring salmon not very plentiful yet

The buzz of spring activity has now extended to the premises of the Prince Rupert Rowing & Yacht Club where almost every pleasure boat is now undergoing some kind of work in preparation for the boating season which is now quite close at hand and, in the case of some, has already started.

A more general herring run is reported this week and during the past few days the fish have been seen in considerable numbers right in the harbor. After three or four weeks of intensive seining at Butler Cove, where the run was centred this year, the local herring requirements seem now to have been about filled.

To increase the storage capacity for this fuel, one of the big tanks on the hill in which coal oil was formerly stored has been turned over to its use, two smaller tanks being put in for the coal oil. The old fuel shed is also still in use and the wharf has been fitted out with electric lights for night loading. A new float and stairs is to be put in on the inside of the wharf for the accommodation of pleasure boat customers. With the waterfront coming to life in great style these days, the Bushby towboat fleet was on the hop during the past week.

N. M. McLean has finished one of the cannery floats for the Wallace Fisheries and it was towed by the M.T.3., Capt. Reg. Green, to Claxton on Thursday. Next week the second will be taken to the old Commerville Cannery which is to be operated as a camp this season in connection with the Mill Bay cannery.

During the past week, the M.T.3 took a boom from Silver Creek to Georgetown and made a couple of trips to the mill for lumber. On Thursday she brought in three scows behind her, one holding four carloads of lumber for Eastern shipment, another having fish boxes for the Booth Fisheries and the third carrying lumber for the local yards.

The M.T.3 and P.R.T. started on Friday to shift all the logs from the Prince Rupert Spruce Mill to Georgetown, about a million feet all told. These logs are included in the deal whereby the Big Bay Lumber Co. comes into possession of the local property of the Prince Rupert Spruce Mill.

The Prince Rupert Boat House tug Pachena, Captain Paul Armour, had a trip to the mouth of the Skeena River yesterday morning to load and bring in two scowloads of sand for Albert & McCaffery.

The cannery tender Plover, recently brought here from Bellingham to be operated in connection with the Port Edward cannery, has been renamed the Port Edward No. 1. The Nokomis, already here, and the Kenmore, coming shortly from the Alaskan peninsula, will be similarly renamed. All are being changed to Canadian from American registry. The Nokomis is at present at the dry dock awaiting engine installation.

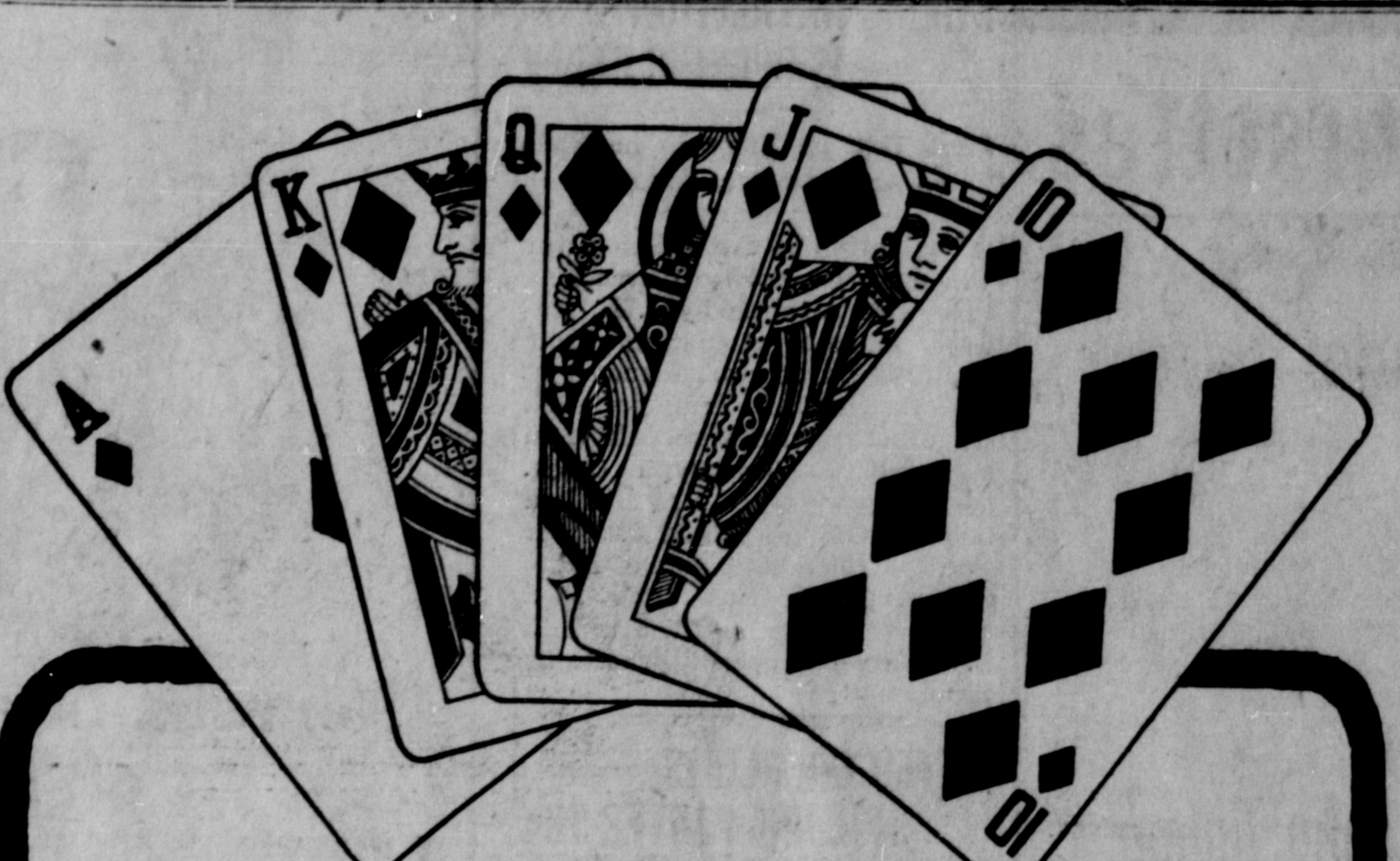
