## REPLIES FROM OTTAWA PEOPLE

R. E. Benson Thanked For Photographs Received of Prince Rupert Elevator

R. E. Benson who recently forwarded about twenty photographs of the local elevator to cabinet ministers and others at Ottawa has received a number of letters thanking him for the picture and some of the letters are quite interesting. Fred Stork, the local member, wrote as follows:

"I wish to thank you for your splendid picture of the Prince Rupert elevator received today and I also wish to say how much I appreciate your public spirit in mailing the picture to many members of the House of Commons and for your letter giving much detailed information in regard to the port.

Team Work

"Nearly every member who has received this picture from you has mentioned the matter to me and it is very gratifying to me to observe this evidence of team work for the building up of Prince Rupert."

Letters were also received from Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Hon. J. H. King, Hon. Rodolph Lemieux, Hon. G. P. Graham, through the deputy minister, from C. W. Cross of Edmonton, and from Robert Forke and D. M. Kennedy. The letter from Mr. Forke follows:

"I am in receipt of your letter and photograph of the government grain elevator at Prince Rupert and note that you say it will be handed over to the government during the coming week.

"I sincerely hope that in the near future Prince Rupert will receive its due share of the Canadian West. I quite understand the advantage which your harbor possesses in being open all the year round."

Peace River Reply

D. M. Kennedy, member for Peace River in parliament, writes:

"I beg to thank you for your letter of the 20th instant and also for the photo you sent of the government grain elevator at Prince Rupert. I have been making some inquiries here regarding the elevator and it is contended by some that it is not quite complete. I am also making some inquiries from the province of Alberta regarding the elevator and its usefulness in connection with the movement of western wheat crop. I have always been impressed with the fact that the ports of the Pacific were twelve months ports and in this way have a tremendous advantage over the eastern ports of Fort William and of course Hudson Bay. I will be very glad if you will give me particulars regarding the reduction of insurance rates on shipping to Prince Rupert. In the meantime I will collect such information as I can regarding the matter from other sources. I will be very much disappointed if the elevator cannot be used as I was one of those who spoke in favor of the elevator, believing at the time that I was advocating something of a benefit to the country as a whole as well as Prince Rupert."
