PRINCE GEORGE

There were 4,389,427 feet of logs sealed in Prince George district during the month of January, according to the report of the district forester. In spite of unfavorable logging conditions, the total was higher than that of January, 1925. The sealings totalling 39,269 ties were away below the total for the same month last year.

Work planned for this district during the coming season by the provincial department of public works includes the gravelling of the Cariboo highway between Prince George and Woodpecker for a distance of about twenty miles; the completion of the Gisscome-Prince George road and various important improvements on other highways.
