LONDON, Sept. 14—Despatches from Sydney, Australia, report that many people were killed in a railway wreck at a lonely spot in the mountains near Blandford, Brisbane county. A despatch to the Evening News says 26 were killed and 60 injured, while Reuter's despatch says three were
