TERRACE, Jan. 30.—The banquet and dance held in G.W.V.A. Hall in commemoration of the birthday of Scotland's immortal poet, Robert Burns, was one of the most successful affairs of its kind in the history of Terrace. About 110 persons partook of the sumptuous banquet arranged for by the St. Andrew's committee convened by Mrs. McDonald. Much credit is due the committee for the exceptionally well planned menu which was thoroughly Scotch to its finest detail. Thomas Young recited the address to the Haggis.

W. Anderson, president of the St. Andrew's Society, proposed the toast to the King. This was followed by an address "The Immortal Memory," by J. Hepburn. Two Scotch songs were then employed. "There was a lad was born in Kyle," by T. Young, and "The Star of Robbie Burns" by J. Swann.

The toast to Canada was given by E. T. Kenney and responded to by J. Morse Hall.

Bonnie Scotland was toasted in a very eloquent manner by Carl Colthurst; response, Jas. Richmond.

Geo. E. Keith then sang "The Wives of St. Ives," which was much enjoyed. This was followed by a toast to Kindred Societies by L. H. Kenney and responded to by J. K. Frost.

The tables were then cleared and a three piece orchestra dispensed music for dancing. The dances were interspersed with Scotch songs, dances and recitations and it was late when the gathering broke up.
