Good Thing To Have Another Mill Here.

The Big Bay Lumber Co. proposes to build a mill on the site of the recently burned Prince Rupert Spruce Mills, provided they get proper consideration from the city. A deal for the site and timber limits has been arranged, subject to confirmation and the probability is that Prince Rupert will treat the company well and that very soon the work of construction will commence. It is something devoutly to be desired.

While the proposed new mill is not as large as the one recently burned it would be much better to have a smaller mill working regularly than a large one operated only intermittently. The Georgetown mill has a good record for operation and if the owners can do as well here, it will be worth a lot to the city.

H. R. McMillan, who is associated with George McAfee in the proposal to build here, is an exporter and is in a position to find a market for the mill product. He is an all round timber man and Mr. McAfee is an all round lumber man so the combination is a good one.

Dunning Went In By Acclamation.

Hon. Charles Dunning was elected by acclamation in Regina and he is now established as minister of railways and canals without any doubt. This is one more step toward making the Mackenzie King Government stable and more or less permanent. One more minister is to be elected in Ontario and then the probability is the work of government will go on about as usual except that attacks on the cabinet will be more virulent and the watchfulness of the opposition greater than usual. That may not be a bad thing, although it will entail a lot of work for the ministers and members of parliament.

We hope Mr. Dunning will find an opportunity to visit Prince Rupert after the session, so that we may see what sort of a person it is who can make or mar us.

Expected Boom Portland Canal.

A Spokane paper says there will be a mining boom in the Portland Canal district this year. He may be right and if he is it will not hurt us. The mines there are certainly doing well and if the forecasts of the mining men are correct and four shipping mines are established this year we shall be likely to hear better things for Stewart and the district which surrounds it.

It is only a few years ago when Stewart was deserted and the few houses there were empty. Now the place is daily becoming more prosperous. There has been a gradual development and that is what the people there want. They know they have the goods and they want to be given a chance to deliver them.

Small Activities Make Neighborhood.

Without pretending to scoff at the big things or at the big prospects ahead, we must remember it is the small activities that make a district. Yesterday we told of a new saw mill about to start cutting lumber at Oona River. It is beginning in a small way but the men who are operating it are enthusiastic and hard working and will probably succeed. Every such small industry means much to Prince Rupert. We want more of them.

FINE CONCERT LAST EVENING

St. Patrick's Day Observed With Entertainment Under Direction of Charles P. Balagno

The annual St. Patrick's Day concert held last night in the Westholme Theatre under the direction of Charles P. Balagno was fully appreciated by a large audience. There were many splendid vocal, instrumental and terpsichorean numbers and probably the most pleasing feature of the entertainment was the arrangement of the program in such a manner that youthful performers contributed almost entirely to the first section. Numbers by boys and girls, though they may not always be of such a finished character as those presented by adult artists, are always appreciated.

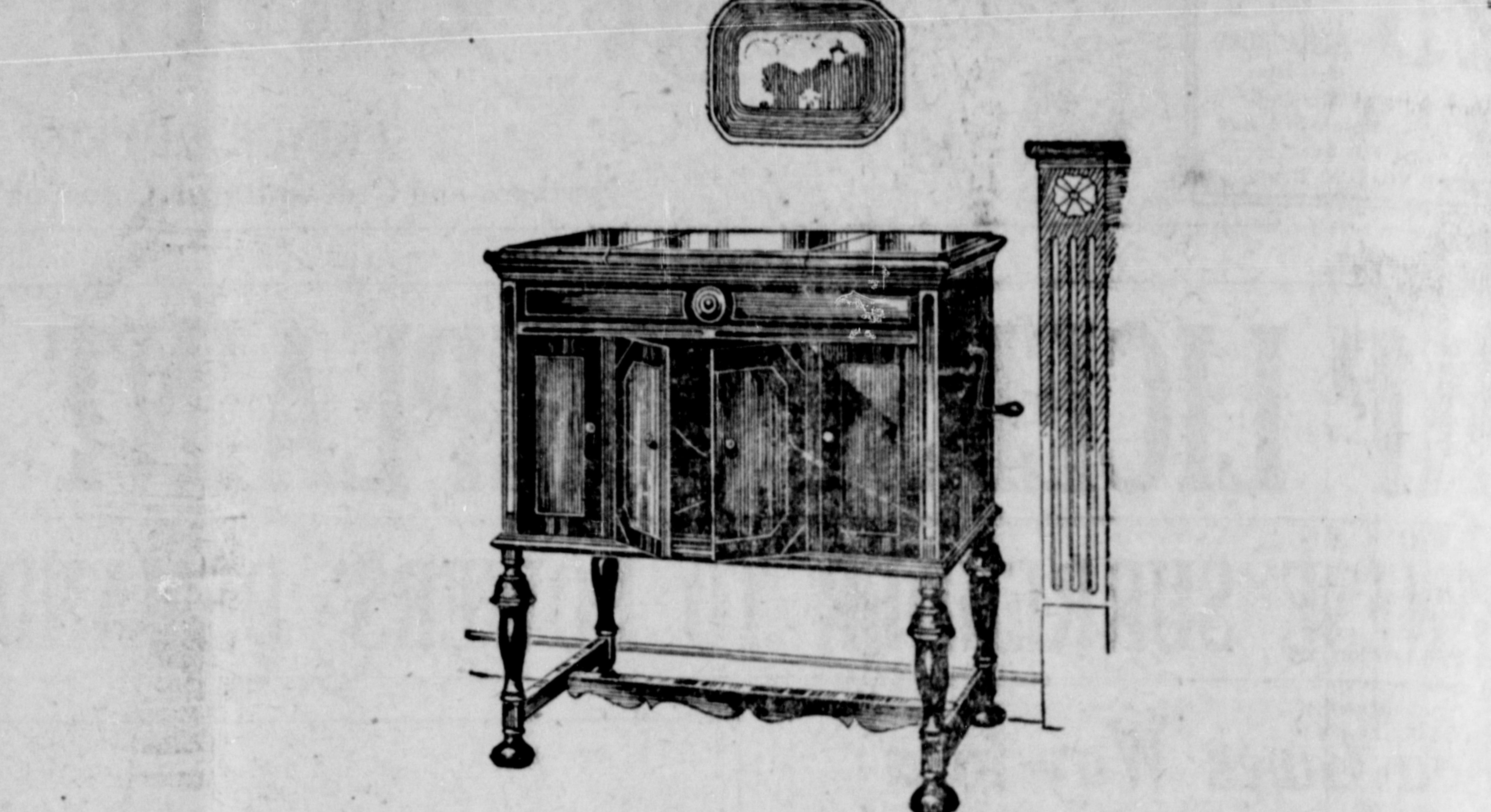
The opening number was a selection "Sounds From Ireland" by the Westholme Orchestra after which there were two choral items, "O Canada" and "A Little Bit of Heaven" by the girls of the Annunciation Church Junior Choir with Mr. Balagno acting as conductor. This was followed by a dumb-bell drill put on by a group of ten boys. Miss Linnea Hanson made her initial appearance on the concert stage singing "Little Town in Old County Down," giving a pleasing lullaby song as an encore. Action songs "There's Nothing Too Good for the Irish," and "The Seventeenth of March, St. Patrick's Day," by a group of ten boys costumed in Irish garb proved tuneful and amusing. Little Miss Elizabeth McLeod, in a very pretty costume, gave as a vocal solo, "Ireland Must Be Heaven," and her dancing of the Irish Jig proved to be one of the most pleasing hits of the program. The little girl was given most enthusiastic applause and her dancing was indeed well performed. An action song and dance "Grandma Told Me All About It" by a group of ten girls was a very pretty number, the early Victorian age costumes presenting a dainty picture indeed. Mrs. J. J. Muldoon sang "Killarney" in her usual good voice and was given an encore. The closing number of the first part of the program consisted of vocal solos by Miss Adene Advant who appeared to good advantage and elicited much applause. Miss Advant has a very pleasing voice and manner. Her songs were "Macushla" and "Ave Maria." William Balagno assisting with a violin obligato for the latter.

Adult Section

The second part of the program opened with choral numbers "Ireland, I Love You" and "The Minstrel Boy" by the Junior Choir of Annunciation Church in full strength. Miss Catherine Jones was much appreciated in her vocal solos, "Come Back to Erin" and "When Irish Eyes are Smiling," and Mrs. F. P. Kenny gave piano solos in her usual finished manner. J. Sabourin sang "I'll Take You Home Again, Kathleen," and responded to an encore with "Mother Machree." The Merry Widow Waltz, given as an exhibition dance by Miss Laura and Howard Frizzell, was well executed and received with pleasure by the audience. Mrs. J. H. McLeod sang sweetly, "The Kerry Dance," and responded to an encore with "My Wild Irish Rose." Miss Adene Advant appeared again with the solo "By the Waters of Minnetonka," and, in an encore, introduced some pleasing coloratura effects. The closing number of the program was an effective recitation by Rev. Dr. Charles J. Cameron of the speech "Irish Aliens and English Victories" which was delivered in the British House of Commons following the Battle of Waterloo by the young Irish patriot and orator, Richard Lalor Shiel, and which has come to be regarded as one of the most brilliant bursts of oratory in the English language. Miss Blanche Curtin assisted as piano accompanist for some of the numbers on the program. Leo Confaloneri directed the boys' drill and the young performers, both boys and girls, were coached by the Sisters of St. Joseph.
