Total Wheat Crop of World This Year is 2,861,000,000 Bushels and Canadu's Quota Good One

EUROPE WILL CONTINUE TO BUY INSURING STABILITY OF PRICES: VOLUME OF CANADIAN PRODUCTION NOT SERIOUSLY AFFECTED

MONTREAL. October 12 .- Forecasts and estimates for the wheat crops in twenty-seven countries in Northern Hemisphere, producing about 85 per cent of the world's wheat supply, indicate a total production of 2,861 million bushels for 1926, an increase of 1.2 per cent over the production of those countries in 1925, says the Royal Bank Report. No record crops and no crop failures have been reported, and a more normal world distribution of the crop is to be anticipated this year than in the past few years. Last year, Europe's large crops resuited in unusually small shipments to European ports, while the surplus supply was absorbed by heavy shipments to the Drient .

Since crops of European importing* countries promise to be smaller than last year and their carryovers are moderately MUST NOT KEEP be available in exporting countries as a whole, international trade in 1923-27 is to be somewhat larger than in preceding years. Steady improvement in European stability is a further factor which gives promise that Europe will continue to buy wheat in good volume in the face of crop reductions this year.
