HEADQUARTERS FOR BIG WORLD ORGANIZATION OPPOSITE STATE DEPARTMENT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12 .- An official agency of the League of Nations, the International Labor Office with headquarters at Geneva, is operating almost at the front door of the State Depart-

Although the United States stays outside the League, recognition has been given to the Washington Branch of the International Labor Office, which is exempt from taxation and which is permitted to import duty free books and documents from the Geneva headquar-

INTERPRETS U.S. LABOR

The office has been operating here quietly for some time and only recently came to public notice with the issuing of a series of public statements dealing with its activities and with the worldwide work of the Geneva office.

Leifur Magnusson, a former official of the American Labor Department, is director of the Washington Branch, the prime purpose of which is to interpret the industrial and labor situation in the United States for the central office.

"The Washington Branch collects federal and state government publications in the field of labor and industry and sees to it that they are regularly dispatched to Geneva," said Mr. Magnus-
