EMPIRE TRADE IS DISCUSSED

SIR ALFRED MOND AND HIS ARGUMENTS IN LIGHT OF PRESENT TENDENCIES

(Montreal Witness) Sir Alfred Mond has returned to England. While in Toronto he warned Canadians that they must soon choose between membership in a commercially united continent or a commercially united Empire. Now he is telling Englishmen that they must make a similar choice: between membership in the rapidly evolving European customs union or in an Empire united for economic purposes. Possibly because of his Canadian addresses and possibly because of the present predicament of the Canadian Conservative party, there has been a considerable interest in Sir Alfred's proposals in the past two weeks.

Certain Conservative well wishers are pointing out that the party has won only one national victory in the thirty-five years since Sir John Macdonald's death. They are also saying that the period of the party's decline is identical with the period of its opposition to the British preferences. Two years ago Colonel Ponton, of Belleville, one of the most respected of Canadian public men, urged upon Ontario Conservatives the necessity of the economic consolidation of the British Empire. At that time his proposals met with an apathetic reception. Canadian Conservatism seemed firmly wedded to the idea of narrow nationalistic protectionism. But two national defeats and the spectacle of a world resolving itself into larger and larger economic units have made certain of the party supporters see matters in a new light.

There is talk of pushing for an Empire Free Trade—Empire Protection policy. It is true that this would but-terly antagonize some of the present supporters of the Conservative party, whose economic views are in line with Mr. Bourassa's. It is also true that such a proposal would meet with opposition from British free traders both from an exporting and a consumer's point of view. We are not now discussing the defects of the proposal or the difficulties in the way of its adoption. What the present tendency shows, however, is that there is an awakening sense of the advantages that would accrue from unrestricted intercourse between one quarter of the world's peoples. If there are different ways of reaching the greater goal, by all means let us hear of them.

FASHION FREAKS LONDON SHOPS

LONDON, Oct. 29.—Many freaks of modern fashion appearing in London shops and other fashion centres indicate that change is taking place everywhere. Autumn is well advanced and Christmas goods are about to appear and in many cases are being shown in order that those who have friends overseas may secure needed presents.

ANIMAL HEADS FOR BUCKLES Squirrel and marmoset heads are being used as "buckles" on fur-topped boudoir shoes being shown in fashionable London shops. The heads of the little animals catch the ankle flaps together, and in the case of the marmoset, its long, silky tail has been used as trimming, and comes up each side of the boot and trims it around the top.

CIGARET POCKETS IN KIMONOS A complete baby squirrel pelt, tall and all, is used as a high collar to trim the latest kimono, which is of jade-green satin, with a special little pocket for the carrying of a jade-green satin cigarette and match case.

SOLDIER FASHION One of the newest decorations for winter dresses is taken direct from the costume of the drummer in a British regimental band, who wears a leopard or tiger skin apronwise over his tunic. A model being shown has a similar apron of leopard skin over a plain black, pleated skirt. The collar and the sleeves are crimson georgette, thus emphasizing the military note. The drummer fashion also was apparent on another model which had gold tissue arranged apronwise coming up in a point between the shoulder blades on a background of sherry red chiffon.

BALLOON STREAMERS The paper balloon streamers that are sold with balloons at the entrance to Kensington Gardens, London, are the inspiration for a new autumn gown which has sleeves banded with all the colors of the rainbow, while the rest of the dress is of severest black.

CHANGE IN HEM LINES Orthodox lines of rectitude have been abandoned by many new model frocks for afternoon and evening wear. The new smartness lies in sloping lines and one-sided effects. Uneven hem lines are carefully cultivated. Some skirts of the ordinary knee length on the right drop to the ankles on the left. The waist line also has become infected with the new vogue. Some of the new waists are as high as a Gibson Girl's at one side and of the modern hip-length depth at the other.

FUR NOVELTIES Among the fur novelties are close fitting, ear-high mufflers made from curly Thibet or similar fur. At first sight one has the impression of a long beard. The muffler slips just inside the neck of the coat and fastens at the back of the neck like a "bib." Gray astrakhan, beige and dyed furs also are worn. Some hats are trimmed with the same fur.

LACE DRESS VOGUE German fashion houses predict that lace dresses will be all the rage at society events this winter. New effects will be obtained by isoquering or waxing the lace and wearing it over frocks of various colors. The color of the undergarment or frock is then reproduced in artificial blossoms fastened to the shoulder of the belt.

FLASHY SPORT CLOTHES Sports clothes this fall are showing an outburst of color, at least in women's wear. Purple golf shoes and green deerkin hats, rich leather purple tweed skirts, stockings of blackberry-and-creep shade, sleeveless cardigans of bright hue, sweaters and scarfs of vivid stripes and checks are among the exhibits.

FLOWERS ON GARMENTS Flowers drawn from the canvases of Van Dongen, great modernist of the French school, will bloom on the garments of women next spring, declares New York, looking ahead as winter comes. At the "spring opening" of a great silk house these new designs revealed themselves as a brilliant reproduction of the technique of brush and oils, applied to silk. Van Dongen's women, with their characteristic elongated eyelid, haunt the flower faces that the silk designer has borrowed.

STATIC IN POLKA DOTS The craze for "kinetic" design, the static reproduction of motion, made famous by a French couturier, has caught hold of the polka dot. INCOMPETENTS ARE IN BUSINESS TODAY SAYS MANUFACTURER

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 29.—"We have too many highly-paid incompetents in business, they should be cleared out," declared Sir William Veno at a Conference in Manchester of manufacturers. "We are the best manufacturers in the world, but the worst salesmen."

Edgar Osborne, managing director of a well-known publicity firm, remembered reading once that a partnership was made between a man with experience and a man with money. When it ended the former had the money and the latter the experience. A similar partnership has long existed be-

tween the distributor and the manufacturer of textiles, said Mr. Osborne. But though the distributor has accumulated the money the manufacturer is still not richer by the experience. He has been deliberately kept in the dark by his partner. 'Buy British Goods' was an appeal to the patriotism of the public, but 'Sell British goods: do not expect someone else to sell them for you,' was a stronger appeal to the commonsense and instinct of self-preservation of the British manufacturer.

SAYS FAMINE GREATEST MENACE FACING CHINA

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 29.—The greatest menace in China is famine, says George E. Ritchey, who has been a missionary of the Disciples of Christ in that country for several years. He is now in the United States on a furlough and will attend the international convention of Disciples of Christ at Memphis, Tenn., November 11-17. Mr. Ritchey points out that Chinese history records 1,828 famines in a period of 1,986 years, an average of nearly one famine a year. Their immediate causes are flood and drought, with contributing factors plant and animal diseases, the growing of low yielding types and varieties of crops, ignorance and superstitions of the people, banditry and the unsettled political conditions of the country.

HAD FOUR WIVES AND THREE BORE CHILDREN

TORONTO, Oct. 29.—Termed by Magistrate T. H. Brunton as a "modern Bluebeard," William John Long, found guilty of bigamy, was sentenced to five years in Kingston Penitentiary. Evidence showed that since 1902 Long had taken no less than four wives of which the court had a record. To at least three of the wives children have been born.
