NEW SKATING RINK ALBERTA UNIVERSITY

Building to Cost \$20,000 Will be Erected by the Students' Union

EDMONTON, April 10.—One more building will be added to those at present standing on the university campus. The proposed structure is a covered rink, which will cost in the neighborhood of \$20,000, and will be erected during the year 1926, by the student's union.

This enterprise, by far the largest to be attempted by the students of the local university since its organization, has been in contemplation for some time, and has been thoroughly investigated as to its feasibility. The plans, which have been drawn by Professor C. S. Burgess, of the university department of architecture, provide for a sheet of ice 90x200 feet, with a seating capacity of 2,000 people.

VOTING MUCH MONEY FOR ALBERTA RAILWAYS

(Edmonton Bulletin) Hon. Vernon W. Smith shattered all legislative records when he succeeded in getting more money for less information than any other minister of the government.

Estimates for the railways department were before the House, and in quick succession the members voted \$271,000 for the Lacombe & North Western; \$561,000 for the Alberta & Great Waterways; \$395,000 for the Edmonton-Dunvegan & B.C., and \$750,000 for the Lethbridge Northern project.

Then came the vote of \$775,000 for the Athabasca Valley Railway Co., which is the name of the new branch line for the E.D. & B.C.
