JEAN JOHNSON BEFORE COURT

Charge an Indictable One and is Adjudged Until Monday

The case against Jean Johnson, colored, 819 Second Avenue, charged with being the keeper of a disorderly house, was proceeded with before Magistrate McClymont in the city police court this morning.

City Solicitor E. F. Jones, prosecuting, moved that the charge be treated as indictable rather than summary. His reason in asking for the change was that the penalty under the indictable charge called for a maximum of twelve months' imprisonment instead of six months if it were summary. He felt that an example should be made so that this woman or any other would be prevented from flaunting vice in the face of law abiding citizens.

Legal Expense

Milton Gonzales appearing in the defence, opposed the change on the ground of legal expense and pointed out that the magistrate had jurisdiction in such a case as this.

The magistrate complied with the request of the crown and the hearing proceeded.

A laborer, Andrew Stevenson, gave direct evidence of immorality having been committed on accused's premises. He further testified that he had purchased beer there and had been offered rum. He also alleged that he had been short changed.

House was Raided

Police officers gave evidence of the house having been raided on March 20 in consequence of a man named Nels Nelson alleging that he had been robbed of \$125. The money, however, was not found.
