The "Observer" on Sunday published a long prefatory note which Mr. Wells has written for the book. A great number of real people are actually named in this story. If I were to get the full effect of contemporary life in which living ideas and movements play a dominant part without doing that. You cannot have a man like Mr. Clissold going about the world of today and never meeting anybody one has never heard of."

If foreign states close their doors to Italian immigrants, the Italians must retaliate by closing their doors to foreign goods and expanding their own markets.

JASPER, July 21.—Jimmy Rimmer, golf professional of the Jasper Park Lodge golf course and champion of Alberta, left here this week for Winnipeg where he will compete in the Western Canada championship to be held here next week. Rimmer is well known to Winnipeg golfers, who will remember him by his feat of lowering the Windsor golf course record by six strokes on his first time around. Before coming to Canada, Rimmer was professional of the Birdstone golf course, at Cheshire, England, and in 1923 he won the championship of Liverpool and district, while in 1924 he was eleventh man in the British open.

EIGHT THOUSAND ARE INDUCED TO EMIGRATE

Various Schemes For Bringing People to This Country Have Considerable Success

LONDON, July 21.—The Dominion's Secretary states that the sailings for Canada under each of the assisted passage schemes during the first five months of this year were as follows:

Government scheme—Nominated persons, 3,327; household workers, 1,094; juveniles of 14 to 17 years, 361.

3,000 Family Settlement Scheme—3,501. Total, 8,283.

Minor Schemes—Society for Overseas Settlement of British women, 58; British Dominions' Emigration Society, 210. Grand total, 8,493.

It is not possible to state the number of applicants who were not accepted, as the greater number of applications are made at the local offices of the Canadian government agents throughout the country, and only those which seem suitable for acceptance are forwarded to the director of migration in London.
