THE NATURAL PORT

An article in the Peace River Record speaks of Prince Rupert as the "natural port of the Peace River country" with an option port at Stewart. This is the opinion that prevails here. We are not asking for a diversion of business from some other point but simply that the business which is naturally ours shall come this way.

We suggest that, no matter what is done to the P.G.E., the first railway extension to be built in British Columbia shall be that connecting the Peace River with the Canadian National, so that the farmers of the country shall get the quickest possible relief.

If the railway is built through British Columbia to Fort Fraser, Tuesday. as is suggested by many, it will open up good land and good timber as well as give an opportunity to develop the rich mines of that part of the country.
