The memorandum is in part as follows:

In 1934, when the people of the Peace River country made their first demand for a railway connection with the Pacific coast, Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railway, after visiting the Peace River country, made the promise that as soon as the country would produce 10,000,000 bushels of grain he would build a railway to the coast.
