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

CANADIAN PRESS SERVICE TELLS ABOUT WORK OF IRVING LINNELL

MARRIED WHILE HERE

Keen Student of Relations of N.S. to This Country

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 9.- (By Canadian Press).—Irving Nelson Linnell, the new United States consul-general to Canada, is almost a Canadian.

Sixteen years ago he took up a law practise in Prince Rupert, B.C. There he married a Canadian girl, Miss Lillian Fisher, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. S. ! Fisher, and their two children were born in the British Columbia town. It was in Prince Rupert that Mr. Linnell entered the American consular service. In 1915 he moved to Vancouver, to accept a higher post in the United States consulate there. Altogether he spent about eight years in British Col-

Mr. Linnell has held consular posts in five different cities, all of them British. From Vancouver he went to England, where he lived in London and Plymouth and then went to Cardiff. Wales. He returned to Washington four years ago to take charge of the Western European Division in the State Department. This division handles Canadian affairs.

SUCCESSFUL TREATY One of the most interesting incidents

in North American history, Mr. Linnell thought, was the negotiation of the Halibut Treaty between Canada and the United States. It had proved one of the most successful treaties of modern times, he said, and he believed it would be even more successful in the future. Mr. Linnell said the happiest and most interesting of his days were spent in British Columbia. He looked forward with keen relish to the pros pect of visiting Vancouver and Prince Rupert again when his work would permit. Mr. Linnell goes to Ottawa about July 1, when the veteran Col John G. Foster, consul-general for the United States there for nearly 25 years retires. One of the posts Mr. Linnell will leave vactant here is that lecturer on consular practice at the Georgetown University.

SCOPE OF WORK

Asked if he anticipated any trouble from that quarter, the new consul-general goodhumoredly pleaded ignorance, having heard nothing officially of the matter.
