LONDON-'I am very glad to be able to announce that there will be a full-length feature film of the Coronation in color by Technicolor including the actual ceremony in the Abbey." J. Ar-1 thur Rank, head of the Britis. motion picture group bearing his name, announced here today. "Yesterday's statement by the Earl Marshall permits us now to disclose that arrangements have been made with Technicolor Limited giving us all their avalable facilities, making pos-

sible what I am sure will be an

outstanding record of this historie occasion," he said. The film has been in preparation and partial production for some time past. It will show in intimate detail events leading up to the ceremony and will of course be the first film 'ever' made in Technicolor of the act of crowning in the Abbey. It is being produced by Castleton Knight whose earlier pictures include "Theirs is the Glory," the story of Arnhem; and the Technicolor films of "Victory Parade," "The Royal Wedding Presents, "Royal Wedding" and

"Fourteenth Olympics." Special arrangements are being made to release the Coronation film throughout the world in a matter of days after the event. For this purpose humgreds of prints will be required involving an immense production plan in the Technicolor plant and most careful organization.

To meet the world wide interest in the film the most rapid distribution arrangements will be required and will be possible through the expansion of Technicolor facilities in Britain,

"I believe this will be a unique film record of a most memorable event in our countries history," says Mr. Rank.

TORONTO-For Canada, special arrangements will be made to fly prints of the Coronation film from London with all possible speed in the expectation that they will be presented in the theatres throughout Canada a few days following the ceremony, and probably in one or two situations before the end of Coronation Week, said Leonard W. Brockington, Q.C., president of the J. Arthur Rank Organizafion of Canada.
