

I notice in your leading article, mention of the fact that the Sewer Bylaw is likely to be turned down.

If the engineer's figures are not correct, will that be sufficient cause, as an assumption only, for turning down the most pressing need the city has today? Those who enjoy the privilege of living in districts where sewerage facilities are already provided, have little conception of the conditions prevailing, which constitute an ever increasing menace to the health of the community at large.

Here we have a condition of septic tanks which are not functioning properly on account of the nature of the country, and what is also just as bad—many houses, all fitted with sanitary arrangements, have no sewer or septic tank connection. It is known that in many cases these houses so completed and unattached, are occasionally using their sanitary fixtures, thus causing a state of affairs unparalleled in any other city in the country. For the sake of ordinary decency alone, let us make a start in rectifying this state of affairs, by overwhelmingly passing this bylaw and thus show the new council that the city as a whole is behind it, for health first.
