# FELL SIBERIA

Nearly Half Million Tons

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct 13 .- Scientists have at last found the resting place of the giant meteor which fell 19 years ago in a remote region of Yenesei Province, Siberia, and, breaking into pieces like an exploding rocket, levelled a forest fifteen miles in circumference. 

### Fishing on Queen Charlottes Improved Toward End of Season and Pack Better Than Expected marked activity in lode mining in the Mayo Mining district, where silver-lead

Queen Charlotte Island canneries made good on the last week 100 feet wide and scorched tree trunks of fishing according to reports reaching the city on the steamer Prince John yesterday afternoon.

During the last week, the Langara Fishing & Packing Co.'s cannery at Massett almost recouped itself from the first of the season shortage and brought its pack for the year up to 25,000 cases.

Just before the end, the B.C. Fishing & Packing Co.'s cannery at South Bay also did well, its season's pack being now placed at 36,000 cases. Aliford Bay was lower with 14,000 cases.
