

## MAY BENEFIT PORTS OF B.C.

GOOD EFFECT FOR CANADIAN COAST  
FORECASTED IF U.S. CONGRESS  
PASSES BILL

VANCOUVER, March 3.—(By C.P.)—A bill now before the United States Congress, and which has already been given a favorable hearing in the Senate, may be of considerable benefit to Canadian seaports.

The proposed legislation, sponsored by Senator King, Utah, will bar from entry to United States ports any vessels carrying crews which include members of nationalities excluded as immigrants. If approved the bill would not permit ships of the Canadian Pacific Limited, the Admiral Line, the great Japanese companies, and many other services to enter the ports of the United States.

United States seamen's organizations are supporting the bill. No direct mention of the nationals affected is made, the clause of the bill reading:

"No vessel shall, unless such vessel is in distress, bring into a port of the United States as a member of her crew any alien who, if he were applying for admission to the United States as an immigrant, would be subject to exclusion under sub-division C of Section 13 of the Immigration Act of 1924."

Under the present law East Indian and Chinese seamen in possession of proper passports, are permitted to land from their ships while in port. If they are not aboard their ship when it sails again, a fine of \$1,000 is exacted from the owners for each missing seaman. In some cases as many as twenty Chinese or East Indians have deserted their ships while in an American port and heavy fines have been paid.

Should the proposal of Senator King be enacted into law, many vessels carrying Orientals as members of their crews would be forced to use the ports of Vancouver, Victoria and Prince Rupert, in place of entering at various United States Pacific ports.

## SCHOONER MCKINLEY MAKING FIRST CALL AT PRINCE RUPERT

The new American halibut schooner McKinley is making its first call at this port today. The vessel is one of 38 tons and carries a crew of ten men. Her master is Capt. B. Hansen, formerly of the Radio. She brought in a catch of 40,000 pounds which is being unloaded at the Atlin Fisheries plant.

## CANADIANS LEAD WORLD IN POWER

Dominion Uses More Electricity Than  
Any Other Country in Relation to  
Population

OTTAWA, March 3.—Canada now leads the world in the public per capita distribution of electricity from central electric power stations. The figures of kilowatt-hours generated per capita per annum by the five leading countries are: Canada 1,260, Switzerland 886, United States 581, Sweden 467, Norway 370.

## CELEBRITIES MAY BE ASKED TO PAY U.S. INCOME TAXES

PHILADELPHIA, March 1.—William H. Taft, chief justice of the United States; David Lloyd George, former premier of England; Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt, and Mrs. Grover Cleveland, and the Right Hon. ## FUR EXPORTS TO BE TAXED IN NORTHWEST

Bill Will be Introduced in Commons  
Authorizing Commissioner-in-  
Council to Collect

OTTAWA, March 3.—Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of the interior, will introduce within a few days in the House of Commons a bill to empower the commissioner-in-council of the Northwest Territories to impose a tax on each fur pelt exported.

## MUCH FISH IS CAUGHT IN LAKES OF MANITOBA

Produced Nineteen Million Pounds Last  
Year Valued at \$865,000

WINNIPEG, March 3.—The catch of fresh water fish in Manitoba last year amounted to 19,000,000 pounds, which had an initial market value of \$865,000. The fishing industry in the province employs over three thousand men. One million dollars is invested in equipment and plants.
