MAY BENEFIT PORTS OF B.C.

GOOD EFFECT FOR CANADIAN COAST FORECASTED IF U.S. CONGRESS PASSES BILL

VANCOUVER, March 3 .- (By C.P.) -A bill now before the United States Congress, and which has already been given favorable hearing in the Senate, may be of considerable benefit to Canadian seaports.

The proposed legislation, sponsored by Senator King, Utah, will bar from entry to United States ports any vessels carrying crews which include members of nationalities excluded as immigrants. If approved the bill would not permit ships of the Canadian Pacific Limited. the Admiral Line, the great Japanese companies, and many other services to enter the ports of the United States.

United States seamen's organizations are supporting the bill. No direct mention of the nationals affected is made. the clause of the bill reading:

"No vessel shall, unless such vessel in distress, bring into a port of United States as a member of crew any alien who, if he were applying for admission to the United States an immigrant, would be subject to e clusion under sub-division C of Section 13 of the Immigration Act of 1924."

Under the present law East India and Chinese seamen in possession proper passports, are permitted to lan from their ships while in port. If the are not aboard their ship when it sai again, a fine of \$1,000 is exacted fro the owners for each missing seaman. some cases as many as twenty Chin men or East Indians have deserted the ships while in an American port an heavy fines have been paid.

Should the proposal of Senator Kir be enacted into law, many vessels carry ing Orientals as members of thier cres would be forced to use the ports Vancouver, Victoria and Prince Ruper in place of entering at various Unite States Pacific ports.

WINNIPEG, March 3 .- The catch of fresh water fish in Manitoba last year amounted to 19,000,000 pounds, which had an initial market value of \$865,000. The fishing industry in the province employs over three thousand men. One million dollars is invested in equipment and plants.

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
