CANADA LEADS WORLD IN ITS GRAIN EXPORT

Is Now Entitled to Wider Term Than "Granary of Empire"-Argentine is Poor Second

OTTAWA, March 3 .- Instead of Canada being spoken of as the "Granary of the Empire," she now aspires to a wider title, for in 1926 she led all countries in the export of wheat and flour, having exported 212,000,000 bushels of wheat. Argentine came a poor second with a little less that 65,000,000 bushels; Australia with 43,000,000; and the United States with 40,000,000; thus Canada alone has exceeded the exports of these countries by over 64,000,000 bushels. Canada's exports of flour amounted to 8,163,000 barrels; the United States 7,430,000 barrels; and Australia 3,750,800 barrels
