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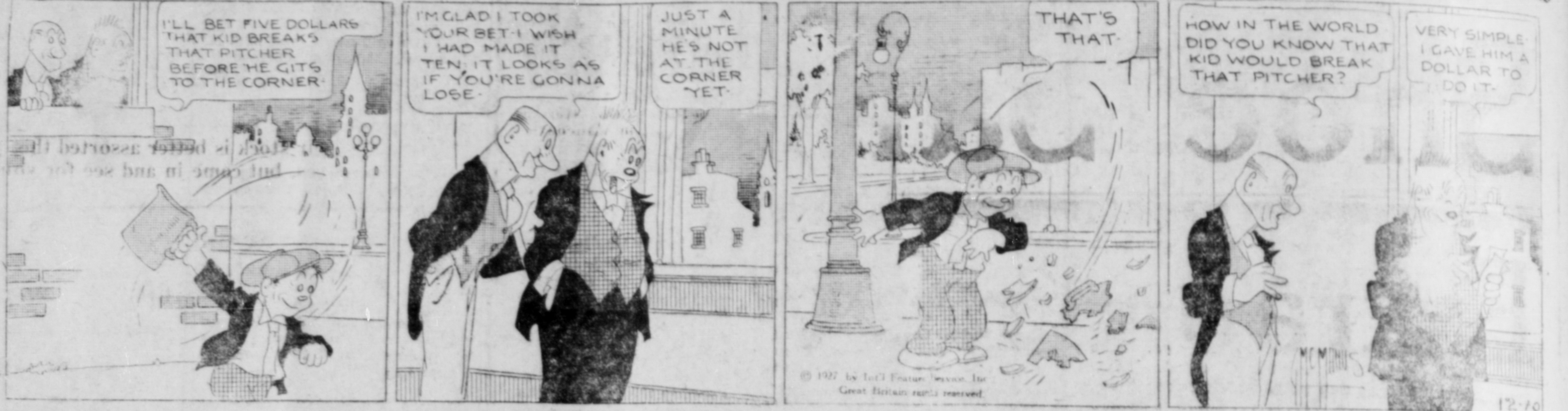

### TERRACE MAY HAVE X-RAY

#### Plans Made to Use Six Hundred Dollar Fund to Best Purpose at Interior Town

TERRACE, Dec. 14.—At a meeting of the hospital board held recently the financial situation came up for a thorough discussion. The treasurer's report showed a cash fund on hand of almost \$600, inclusive of Women's Hospital Auxiliary funds. It was decided that it would be unwise to attempt to re-open the hospital at the present time and that the interest of the community would be better served by using the money for some purpose which would tend to assist in the treatment of more patients in their homes instead of having them make a long, tiresome and often painful journey to one of the nearest hospitals.

Dr. Brummitt was present at the meeting and told the members that while he had not been here for a long enough time to make a very thorough investigation into conditions and so did not feel prepared to recommend what the board should do, he would say that if he had that sum of money to expend to assist him in his work, he would consider an x-ray machine the most necessary and most helpful piece of equipment he could buy.

Many of the local accident cases could be treated in their own homes were x-ray examinations possible here and the patients would be saved the expense of railway fare, hospital bills, etc. It would also undoubtedly prove to be an encouragement as well as an inducement to a doctor to remain here. Should the board decide to expend the money in this manner, a machine will no doubt be bought on the installment plan and once it is installed, the x-ray fees charged will be applied on future payments.

### IMPROVEMENTS TO BE MADE TO HOSPITAL

#### Men's Wards and Caseroom to be Re-plastered and Painted—Other Work Under Way

The question of repainting the walls and ceilings of the men's surgical and medical wards and the caseroom came in for considerable discussion at the meeting of the hospital board last night and it was finally decided, on recommendation of the house committee, that arrangements be made with John Bremner to completely re-plaster and replaster the caseroom and patch the walls of the wards following their painting.

It was also decided to comply with a recommendation made by the fire marshal and fire chief that the range in the kitchen be raised two inches from the floor. This will necessitate a change in the water piping and it was decided that a new hot water boiler be installed if necessary to replace the present one which has recently suffered some blowouts. Other recommendations made by the fire chief, it was reported by C. H. Elkins, chairman of the house committee, had already been complied with.

It was also reported by Mr. Elkins that an electric heater had been placed in the caseroom to supplement the heating system of the building and that some necessary repairs had been made to the elevator.

### WOULD NOT ADMIT DRUNK PATIENTS INTO HOSPITAL

H. B. Rochester spoke at last night's meeting of the hospital board against the policy of allowing inebriated sufferers from delirium tremens and other such complaints being permitted to enter the hospital for treatment along with respectable patients. The place for such people, he said, was in the jail. It was an outrage which he felt should not be permitted.

H. W. Birch, managing secretary, pointed out that the hospital was operating under government support and regulations provided for the admission of all patients on doctor's order, save those suffering from smallpox.

"If that is the case, then the constitution should be changed," urged Mr. Rochester in reply. He pressed that the matter should be taken up with the government.

Miss Jean Harrison, R.N., lady superintendent, reported that it was not the general practice of the doctors to send in such patients.

Other members of the board agreed with Mr. Rochester's views and it was decided, if nothing else could be done, to at least rigidly enforce the payment of such patients' accounts.

The perplexing problem of tie contests has raised a furor in big league hockey circles for definite measures to eliminate the increasing number of no-decision games. President Charles C. Clapp of the Canadian-American Hockey league suggests a wider net as a means of combating draw contests, and proposes to present his view to the National Hockey league rules committee. With a view of speeding up the sport, changes were made before the opening of the current season, calling for a shorter stick, decrease in goal pads and a forward pass rule in the defensive zone.

Nevertheless, tie contests have been as apparent as ever, if not more so. In the National league virtually half the games played so far this season have resulted in draws. Of 42, 18 have ended in no verdicts despite 10-minute overtime periods. During the first quarter of the Canadian-American circuit, there have been nine tie games. President Clapp believes a more satisfactory contest would develop by the use of a larger net.

Possibility that professional baseball may see another controversy, such as that which shook the game before the present major-minor league accord was reached is seen when the National Association of Professional Baseball Clubs orders five of its members to discontinue their modified draft agreement with the majors. The American Association, the International League, the Pacific Coast League, the Three-I League and the Western League were ordered to discontinue the modified draft immediately, fourteen leagues voting aye on the resolution and five no. Those which voted against the resolution were the Pacific Coast League,
