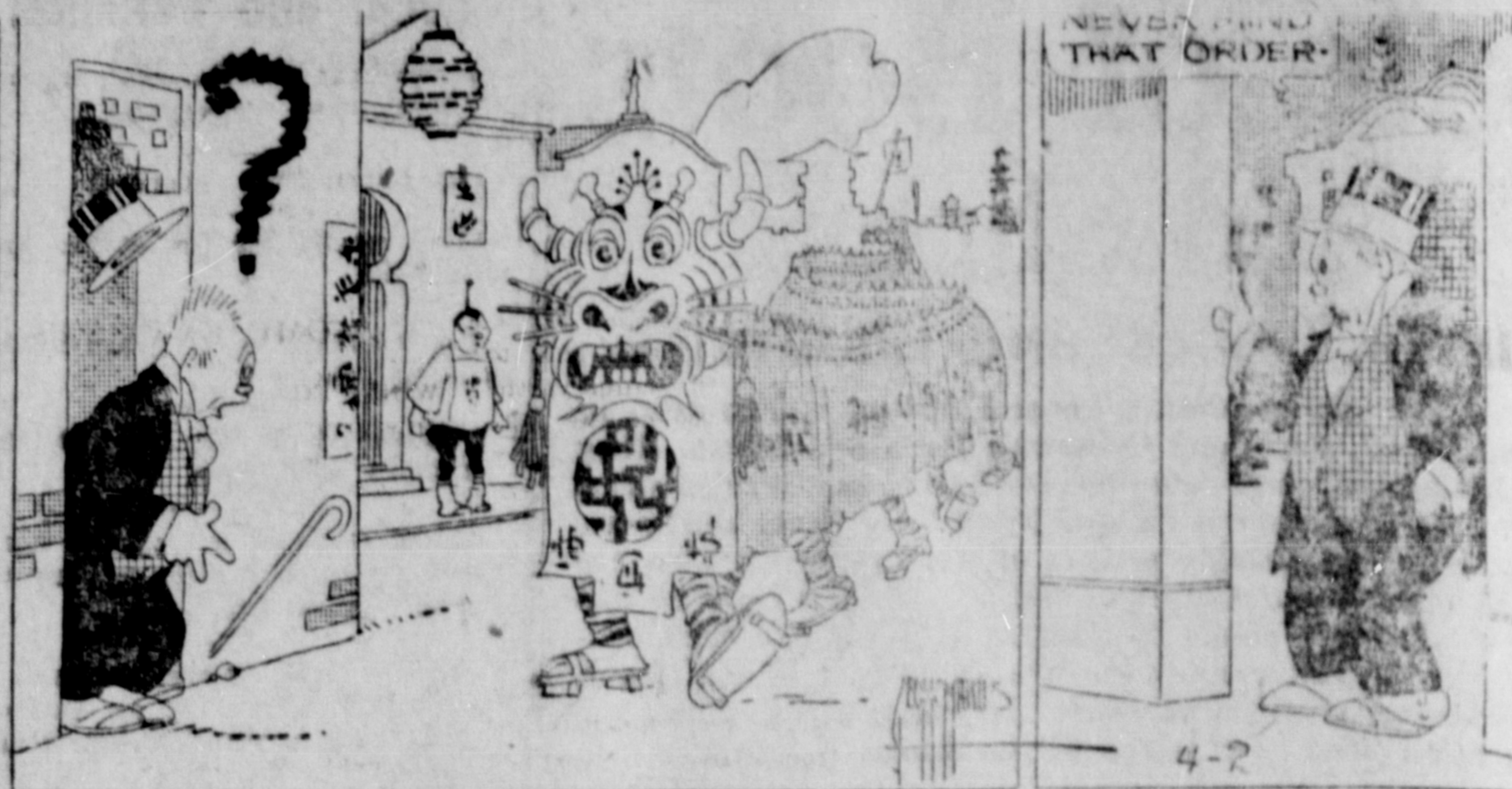
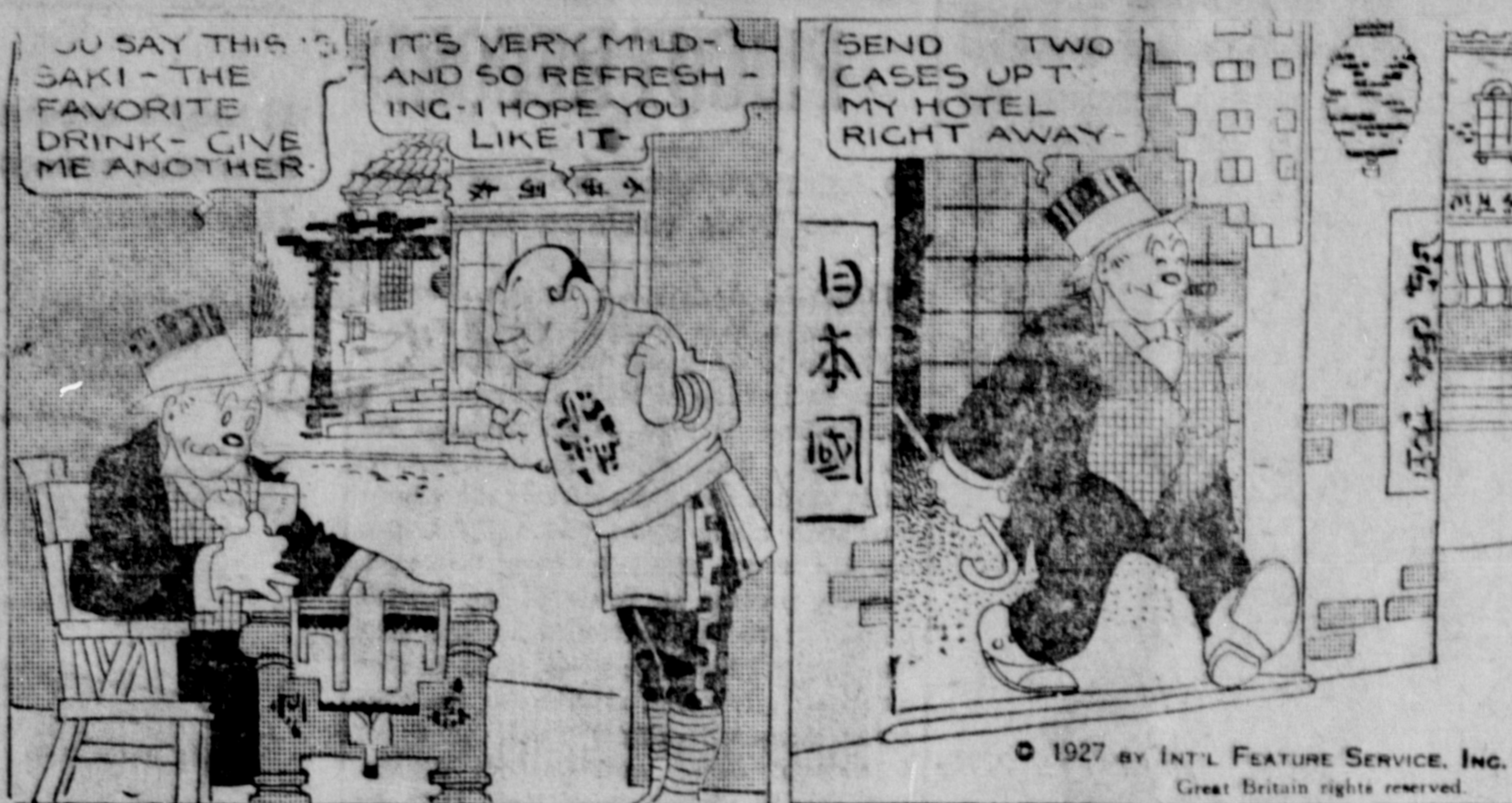

NEW ADMIRAL IN ATLANTIC

SIR HUBERT BRAND SUCCEEDS SIR HENRY OLIVER, COMMANDER SINCE 1924

LONDON, April 7.—(Canadian Press).—Vice-admiral Sir Hubert Brand will take over the command of the Atlantic Fleet this summer. He succeeds Admiral Sir Henry F. Oliver, commander-in-chief of the Atlantic Fleet since 1924.

Sir Henry Oliver in August will have completed the full tenure of three years as Commander-in-chief of the Atlantic Fleet. He has been in continuous employment for many years, and has probably had a more varied experience of administrative posts, staff service, and executive commands than any other admiral on the active list. As a captain, he was head of the Navigation School, Naval Assistant to the First Sea Lord, and (when war broke out) Director of Naval Intelligence. From November, 1914, to the beginning of 1918 he was Chief of the War Staff, and Mr. Churchill, Lord Fisher, and others have borne testimony to his services in this post. Sir Henry commanded a battle-cruiser squadron in the Grand Fleet in 1918-19, with his flag in the Repulse, and in 1919-20 was Vice-Admiral commanding the Reserve Fleet. Then for four years, from 1920 to 1924, he was Second Sea Lord charged with responsibility for naval personnel during a difficult time of rearmament. It is expected that Admiral Oliver, who was 62 years of age in January, will return to the Admiralty later in the year as First Sea Lord, when the resignation of Lord Beatty, now deferred at the request of the First Lord, may be accepted.

Sir Hubert Brand has been at the Admiralty since March, 1925, and was appointed Second Sea Lord from the post of Naval Secretary to Mr. Bridgeman on the death of Vice-Admiral Culme-Seymour. When the war broke out he was at Tokyo as Naval Attaché, and in 1915-16 was Naval Assistant to the Second Sea Lord. On Admiral Beatty being appointed Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Fleet, Commodore Brand, as he then was, took up the duty of Captain of the Fleet on the Admiral's Staff in the Queen Elizabeth. For about four years after the war he was in command of His Majesty's yachts, and he is now an Extra Naval Equerry to the King. In 1922-24 he was in command of the First Cruiser Squadron, and made the voyage round the world. Vice-Admiral Brand will be 57 on May 20. His appointment to the Atlantic Fleet will almost coincide with the entry into service with the Fleet of some of the first post-war vessels, among them the battleships Nelson and Rodney.

NEW GREAT SEAL IS NOW NECESSARY

To Conform With Views of Imperial Conference

LONDON, April 7.—(Canadian Press).—The passing of the Royal Titles Bill, whereunder the titles of His Majesty and of Parliament are changed to conform with views presented by the Imperial Conference, necessitates the provision of a new Great Seal, the specific emblem of royal authority. Any document to which the Great Seal is attached is the instrument by which the will of the Sovereign is declared, such as Proclamations summoning Parliament, charters to towns, treaties with foreign powers, credentials to ambassadors, patents of nobility, and appointments of Colonial governors.

Green sealing-wax is used if the instrument is of a permanent character, red or yellow in the case of documents of limited duration. The Seal is not impressed on the document itself but attached to it by a silken cord, and is formed in a die composed of two heavy silver discs hinged together so as to form a mould. In size it is nearly three inches across and a quarter-inch thick.

The Lord Chancellor is responsible for the safety of the Great Seal, or rather of the moulds, and keeps them in a secret safe whose whereabouts is supposed to be known only to himself, though history records the fact that during the reign of George III. burglars carried it off from the premises of Lord Thurlow, then Lord Chancellor. This is the only occasion on which a Great Seal is known to have been permanently lost.

The King himself may leave Great Britain without imperilling the Constitution, but if the Lord Chancellor wants to go abroad elaborate arrangements have to be made for appointing a commission of responsible people to look after the Seal.

When a new Great Seal is made the old undergoes a process called "demasking." The King in the presence of the Privy Council, gives the old one a gentle blow with a hammer and it then becomes the property of the Lord Chancellor.

LONDON, April 7.—(Canadian Press).—Emil Russ, lately residing at Herne Bay, paid ten rupees (13s. 4d.) for a ticket in the Calcutta Sweep, and won £15,800. The other day he appeared for his examination in bankruptcy, eight years after he had made his big win. He owes £2,700 and admits that he had since lived at the rate of nearly £2,000 a year.

Preliminary information on the probable entries in the Olympic Games to be staged in Amsterdam next summer (1928) shows that large numbers of contestants from practically every country will again gather to battle for the Olympic titles. Within Holland alone, well over 100 contestants in various events, exclusive of numerous officials, have already signified they will compete. These include 16 boxers, 12 horsemen, with 15 horses, 10 tennis players and nine persons for each 8 metre yacht entry; eight for each 12 foot yawl entry. In addition some 30 yacht racing officials, 30 boxing officials, 20 horse-racing officials and 10 tennis officials will be present.

So far information on probable contestants does not cover every country expected to send entrants, but particulars of some of the contestants from about 13 countries, including Great Britain, are available. Great Britain will send at least 100 athletes, 60 swimmers, 18 cyclists, 8 gymnasts, 44 fencers, 7 wrestlers and 20 weight-lifters, a total entry of 257. Hungary proposes to send 80 competitors for various events; Estonia about 50 competitors and Letland a football team in addition to five competitors in light athletic sports, four cyclists, five wrestlers, five weight lifters, four boxers and five Pentathlon marksmen. Finland will send 150 competitors including a football team. Rumania will send entrants for the games but not for the hockey events, and Czechoslovakia will send 10 cyclists, 10 athletes, six tennis players, six boxers, twenty swimmers, sixteen fencers, eight gymnasts and nine horsemen with a number of officials for each sport as well as a representative contingent for Graeco-Roman wrestling and weight lifting competitions, yachting and rowing events.

From Germany will go 400 representatives, including 30 or 40 football players, 10 tennis players, 15 fencers and 4 women fencers, 12 horsemen, 40 swimmers, 10 weight-lifters, five wrestlers, 16 boxers and 18 cyclists, total of 494 active competitors, with as many or more officials. Italy will send 200 representatives including officials, while Japan will participate. Switzerland has officially decided on at least a hockey team. One hundred and fifty will represent Brazil, inclusive of officials.
