### PREMIER OLIVER

So much has been written and said of the late Premier Oliver that it is difficult to add anything of importance. He was a self-made man and in spite of his great successes remained the same plain unassuming personage that in his earlier days presided over the farm household down in the Delta. Yet in spite of the fact that he could not be spoiled by success he took an immense pride in his work and gloried in the fact that he was able to do something worth while for his province and through it for Canada.

When it is understood what the conditions were under which Mr. Oliver took hold of affairs and the condition in which he left them, it is easy to understand his occasional petulance when attacked at meetings by those who were so much inferior in intellect, in resourcefulness and in courage. He was intensely human, and this broad humanity was the means of carrying his Government back to power again and again.

History will place Premier Oliver high among the builders of Canada and his memory will be an inspiration to many young men and women anxious to serve their country.

### AND WHAT OF THE FUTURE?

So there emerges Dr. J. D. McLean, now the acknowledged leader of the Liberal Government. Under him the party stands united as before and under him it seems probable much useful work will be done for the province.

"Give McLean a chance" will undoubtedly be one of the slogans of the party now in power. He is a safe man, and one to be trusted. The next few months will tell whether he has the hold on the party and the country that will enable him to carry on successfully.

### ROAD QUESTION ONCE MORE

The people of Prince Rupert are asked to study carefully the whole question of the highway to the interior. This year it is to be supposed will see the completion of the road to Galloway Rapids and then there is a question as to whether the road should go to Port Edward, along back of the Port Edward townsite touching on the chain of lakes there, or turning toward Cloyah River and Wark Canal. The route is the first important thing to determine. We want the road and want it badly, but it must go in the right direction so that it will be a part of the main highway which is to give connection with the outside world.


We suggest that the route advocated by R. H. Leighton be studied. Frankly we do not like it because it will take too long to construct. If there is to be a diversion to the Naas River, let it go by the most direct route including Terrace. However, the first thing to do is to locate the best route and then stick by it. Remember, we have a piece of completed road in the woods opposite Digby Island which is a monument to some hasty politician who was determined to build something in answer to the demands of the populace. Let it be a lesson to us all. Proper plans must precede construction.

## IN THE LAND OF MIDNIGHT SUN

Story of Girl Who is Coveted by Two Russians, One a Duke

In the "Midnight Sun," Dimitri Buchowetzki, noted Russian director, has produced one of the biggest screen spectacles of the year. It is a Russian story staged in a lavish setting that rivals even the "Phantom of the Opera" and other great screen successes. It is to be shown tonight and tomorrow. In addition to its magnificent sets, Universal spared no expense when it came to casting the players, making of "The Midnight Sun" an all-star production.

The story from which the picture was adapted was famous some years ago in Europe as one of the most dramatic narratives of the old days of the monarchy and of the uprisings of student nihilists, forerunners and first warning of Bolshevism. The story deals with a girl, member of the Imperial Ballet, who is coveted by two men, one of them a Grand Duke commander of the military power of Russia; the other a banker, the money monarch of the country; and the girl's love for a young officer of the Grand Duke's staff. ## PRINCE CHARLES IS UNDAMAGED

C.N.R. Steamer Freed Herself From Rose Spit Without a Scratch

Her hull unscratched and otherwise no damage done as a result of her stranding on Wednesday at the end of Rose Spit, which juts out for miles from the northeast corner of Graham Island, C.N.R. steamer Prince Charles, Capt. Neil McLean, arrived in port at 2:30 yesterday afternoon from the Queen Charlotte Islands, continuing her voyage to Vancouver at 5:30 following the arrival of the train from the East.

It was about 6 o'clock Wednesday morning, the weather being thick and visibility poor, when the vessel hit the sandy beach of the spit. The master immediately aroused the passengers and took steps to raise the bow of the vessel by lowering the anchors and emptying the tanks, etc. The vessel was still fast and remained so until about 3 o'clock in the afternoon when she floated off on the rising tide some time before its height. In the meantime, a wireless message was sent out for assistance and the Salvage King was sent out for the scene from the coast. Her aid was, however, unnecessary as it turned out. Officers of the vessel made an examination of the hull while she was ashore and found it sound, without a mark. There was not even a boulder on the beach for miles.
