Announcement is made that finances for development have been completed in the East and that work will be rushed during the summer on the Woodbine group.

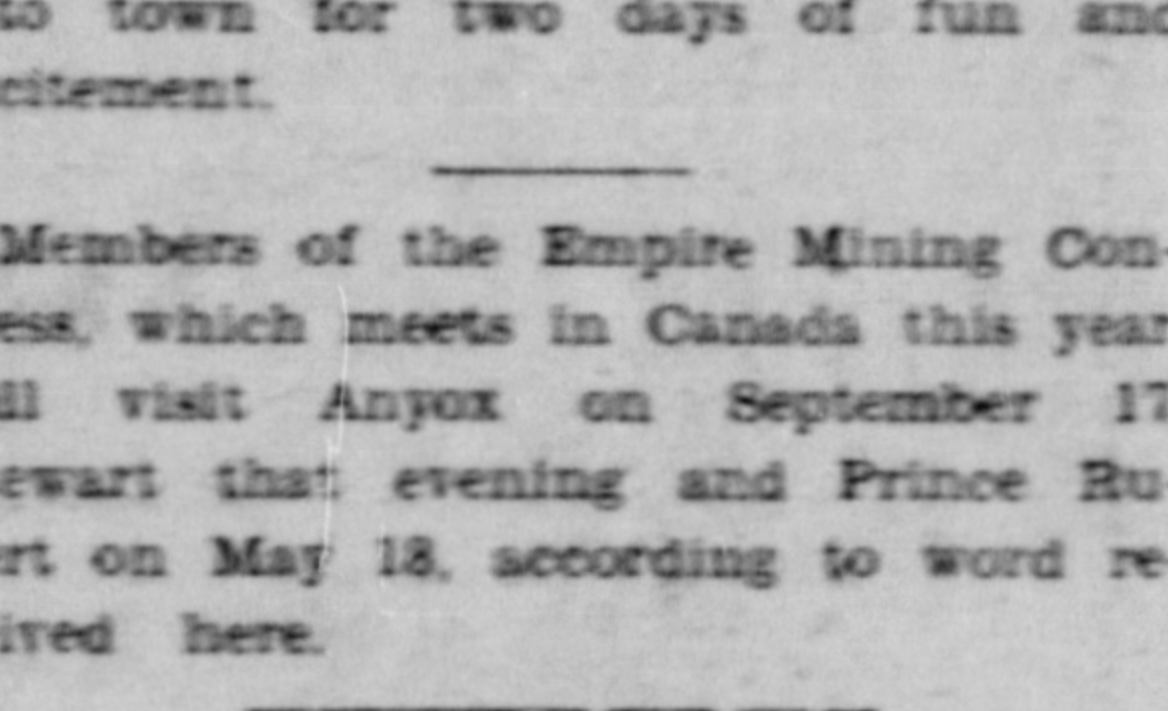
Road and trail work started full blast up the Bear River last week, several camps being established.
