Half Million Pounds Halibut Was Offered For Sale Here Today

Today's list of halibut offerings at the Fish Exchange was one of the largest of the season. It was nearly two o'clock this afternoon when the sale concluded and then some of the Canadian catches were held over until tomorrow's bidding. A total of 504,800 pounds was offered and three American vessels, with 149,000 pounds, not satisfied with prices offered, left for Seattle in the hope of striking a more favorable market later in the week. Sale of the catches of four Canadian vessels, totalling 30,500 was deferred until tomorrow.
