

Single persons, and widows and widowers without dependent children \$1,200.00 Each dependent Insurance Premiums paid but not exceeding \$500.00 Non-resident persons (only) \$1,000.00 Assessors will make the necessary corrections on returns where rebates, as revised, have not been claimed.

An individual whose income does not exceed \$900.00 is not required to file a return except upon demand of the

Returns should be made promptly in order to avoid incuring penalties.

The necessary forms and full information may be obtained upon application to any Provincial Assessor or to the Commissioner of Income Tax, Victoria.


