HOCKEY GAMES TO COMMENCE MONDAY

Detroit to Have Two Teams Playing This Season

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 12.—Detroit hockey enthusiasts will receive more than their share of this form of en-

tertainment in the oncoming season of 1927. The automobile city will be represented with two teams this year—the Detroit Cougars, a major league team, playing its second season in the National Hockey League and the Detroit Olympics, a minor league team playing its first season in the Canadian Professional Hockey League.

Both teams will open their seasons Monday and both, likewise, will make their 1927 debut on hostile ice.

Jack Adams, late of Ottawa and Toronto, will manage the Detroit Cougars during the season of 1927, while Frank Foyston, former Cougar centre, has been signed to handle the Detroit Olympics.

CHARTER SHIPS FOR BIG EVENT

**Baptist World Alliance to Hold
Fourth Congress in Toronto
Next Summer**

TORONTO, Nov. 12.—Canadian Baptists are already making arrangements for the fourth congress of the Baptist World Alliance, which is to be held in this city next summer. Six thousand delegates from all parts of the world are expected together with representatives from the mission fields of the seven seas. A steamship will be chartered to bring to Canada the visiting Baptists from the British Isles and special trains and automobile caravans are being arranged from various points in Canada and the United States.

The National Committee of the congress met recently in Toronto and heard reports from the local executive committee and its sub-committees. Plans for the great gathering are well advanced. The delegates will be housed in several buildings of the Canadian National Exhibition. The meetings will be held in the exhibition buildings on the front of Lake Ontario. Other arrangements are being worked out in detail by the special committees.

An extensive exhibit, showing Baptist work in all its phases, will be one of the outstanding features of the congress. This is being arranged by the local committee with the co-operation of the Northern and Southern Baptist Conventions of the United States, and other organizations abroad.

Word from headquarters in London indicates that the program which is being prepared for the congress will be one of the best ever presented to a Baptist gathering. Probably the most significant meeting will be the roll-call on the afternoon of June 23, when reports of every Baptist constituency in the world will be presented.

The local bodies are preparing for excursions and other entertainment for the visitors.

TWO FIRES IN COLD WEATHER

**Department Deals Promptly With
Conflagrations Which Might
Have Been Serious**

The cold weather last night was responsible for two fires that might have been attended with serious results had the fire department not dealt with them promptly.

At 7:40, the first call came in from the residence of C. T. Saunders, 349 Ninth Avenue West, where a heater on the second floor placed too close to the wall set the latter on fire. The room was scorched but the use of chemicals prevented serious damage.

The more serious incident occurred at 10:45 in the home of P. M. Raynor, 506 Fourth Avenue East, who are absent from the city on a holiday. Friends went in to kindle a fire and the kitchen range exploded, being virtually blown to pieces. The water system, including the water jamket, was apparently frozen up, this being given as the cause for the explosion.
