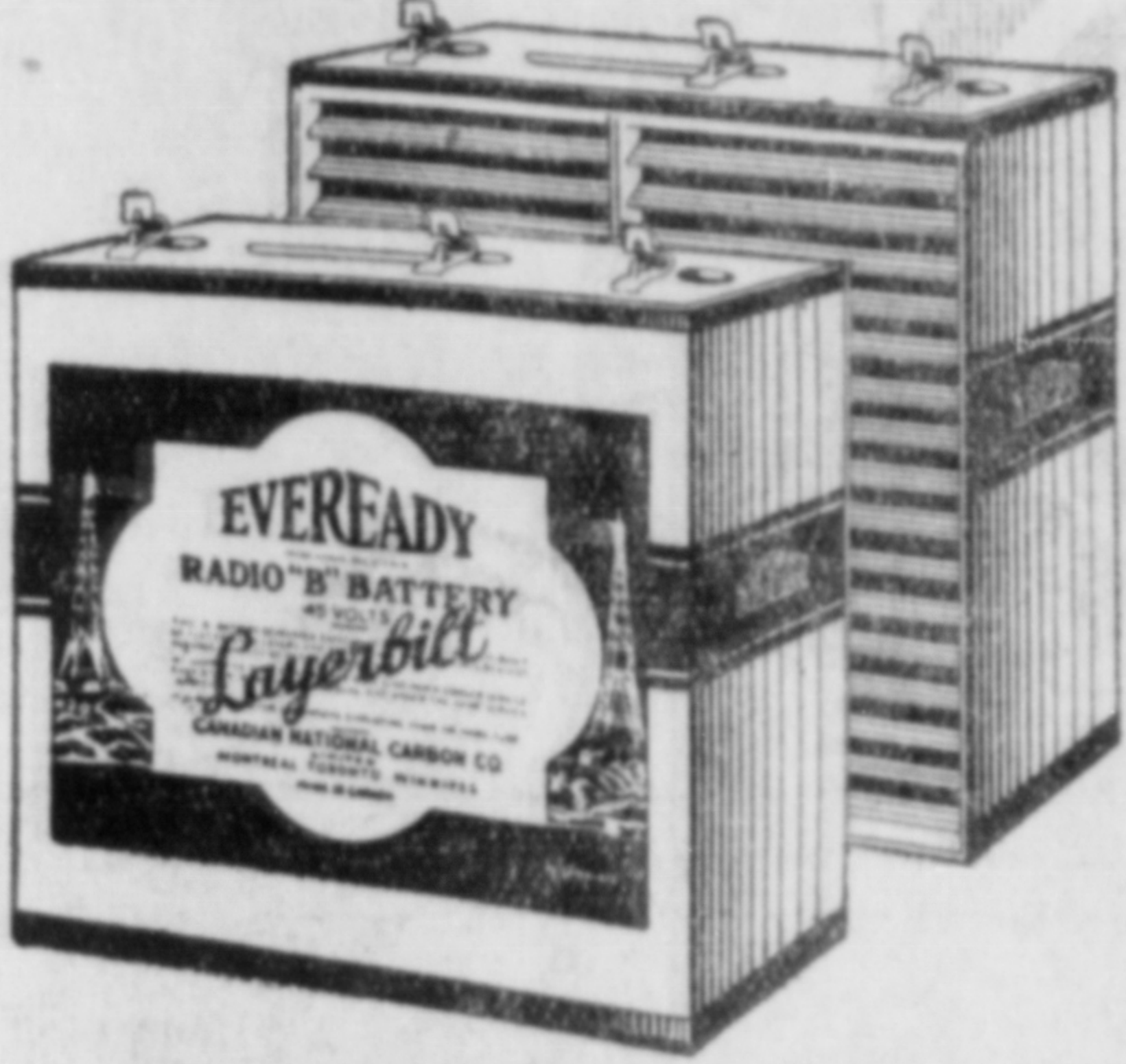

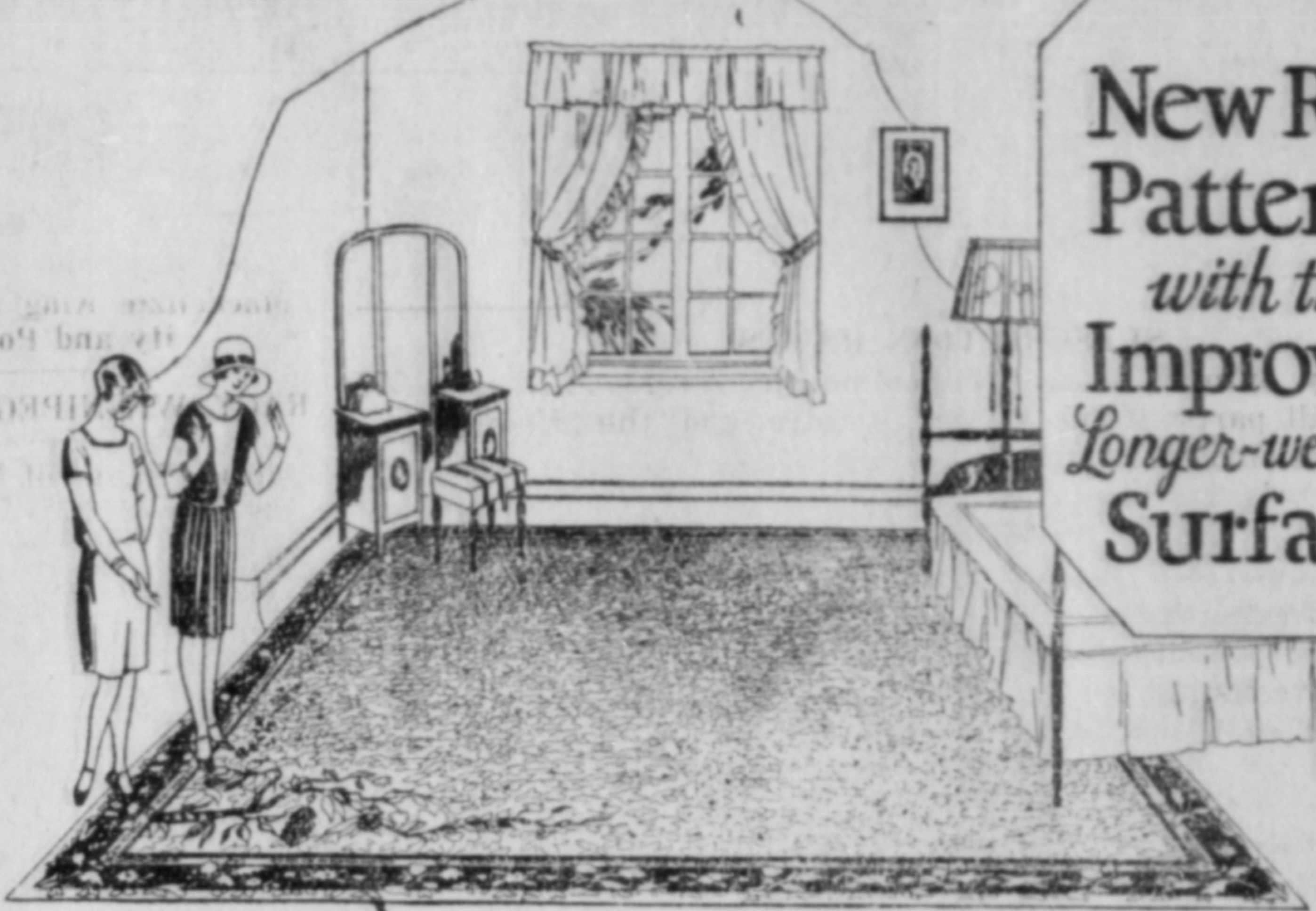

Many thousands of women are standing at the family washtubs every Monday morning under the impression that they are saving money by doing their own washing. In the course of their studies in household economy in an eastern university, four of the students decided to make a test of this for themselves.

They visited a home consisting of five persons, the parents and three small children, and actually did the weekly family wash, accomplishing the work complete in three hours, using a \$150 electric washing machine.

Being students of economic costs, they were careful to accumulate cost data and this is what the wash cost without any labor charge:

Deterioration of machine	50c
Electric current	10c
Water	05c
Fuel	15c
Soap (actual cost)	10c
Washing Powder	05c
Blueing	02c
	97c
