Government Official Recommends Against Establishment at Hospital-Conferred With

cial meeting held recently by the hospital board with Dr. A. S. Lamb, provincial government inspector of hospital, at the monthly meeting of the board last night, revealed that the official had given his opinion that the establishment of a pharmacy in connection with the Prince Rupert General Hospital was inadvisable. This has been a moot question before the hospital board during the past few months following allegations that lack of cooperation existed between the hospital and the drug house now supplying it. At the conference with Dr. Lamb, the advisability of extending the local hospital or building a new one had been discussed and Dr. Lamb had stated that the department of health might give assistance in connection with the establishment of a laboratory.

Dr. Lamb had suggested some revisions in the method of computing hospital days.



ENGLISH METHOD One basis for experimental work has been the method worked out in England during the last year or two whereby the fish waste there is made into glue. The waste is washed free from impurities first in dilute alkali, and then in dilute acid, heated below boiling and strained free of the liquor. This liquor when separated from the oil included L. R. ## COOKING FISH WASTE

To understand clearly the difficulties which would attend this new process we must know the methods now in use. The more or less, to point of commencement, to the point of commencement, and con- fish glue makers of the Atlantic Coast fish waste is collected in scows at the emptied by means of a bucket line conveyor into cylindrical steam jacketed cookers resembling locomotive boilers. The cookers are heated with steam under pressure for several hours. The mass when thoroughly cooked is transferred to a hydraulic or screw press and the liquid pressed out. The solid matter quality liquid glues have been prepared remaining is dried over steam coils with heated air, ground up and sold as stock or poultry food. The liqour which was pressed out from it is boiled up for few minutes, and separates into layers The upper layer is the fish oil which is extensively used in the tanning industry. The lower layer is a mixture of dissolved proteins and salts, and corresponds to the glue layer in the modi fied process described above. It does indeed contain a considerable amount of glue, but contaminated with many impurities and permanently weakened by heating under pressure. These defects can be remedied by a careful washing


MODERATE SUCCESS

In experiments carried out on a small scale at the Fisheries Experimental Station (Pacific), several samples of good from fish heads. Further work will be undertaken to improve the quality of the glue, and modify methods of manufacture to meet conditions on this coast. In many places the supply o conserve it, the most efficient method to be determined. Lack of space and lack of time in the busy season may make it impossible to wash the stock completely and methods will be tested to remove the impurities after the glue has been made.

In addition, there are many fish-dog fish, rat fish, skate-which are caught in great numbers by fishermen but are worthless. These will be tested with a view to obtaining glue from them.

The experimental work on this whole problem is only in its initial stages and will require a year or two for its completion, but preliminary work has demonstrated the possibility of making a satisfactory glue, the commercial value and demand for such a product, and the profit to the fishing industry of the complete utilization of its waste
