NEW YORK, May 11 .-- Mr. Justice Peters of the Supreme Court dismissed the suit of the Irish Free State claiming to be the successor of the Irish Republic and entitled to bonds valued at two and a half million dollars subscribed for in the United States for the Republican

The court also denied the claim of De Valera and his co-trustees to the bonds and ruled that the bonds be sold and the proceeds revert to the original subscribers.

Reorganization in Customs Services Adding to Revenue; Changes Just Now Announced

OTTAWA, May 11 .- For the first four months of the present year the customs revenue was \$52,000,000 compared with \$13,000,000 for the same period in 1926, according to a statement issued by the department.

The statement further declares "the present indications point to a general upward trend in customs revenue for the fiscal year now entered upon. This is due largely to the placing of the customs service on an efficient, businesslike basis."

In the event of a customs officer having reasonable and probable grounds to believe that an indictable offence has been committed, whether it has or not, he is justified in arresting the offending person without

a warrant. NEW PROVISIONS

Several new provisions with regard to cargoes of ships and single shipments have been introduced to protect the Customs in levying duty. Delay of non-payment by owners of post entry for duty on shipments coming into Canada will henceforth give the Customs Department power to exercise llen on any subsequent shipments of goods imported by that owner. In cases where a sight entry is given for goods where the invoice for description of the goods is not abailable, the owner will he subject to a penalty in the event of Royal Fish co. within the proper time allowed.

Under the amendment, all property of passengers and crew with the exception of wearing apparel must now " be shown on the report of the master

Vessels carrying in transitu liquor landed on Canadian soil, according to the amendment of the Customs Act of of the Federal Parliament.

CARGO TRANSFERS It was previously possible for vessel

carrying liquor billed via a Canadian port to land their cargoes for transfer to another vessel. In future, when this be carried from Victoria to Kamloops is done, or even in the event of ship with liquor putting into a Canadian port for shelter, provisions, repairs or any other reason, ship owners High River, Alberta, and will be relayed must require a certified guarantee company to put up bond for double the amount of duty which would be levied on the lipuor cargo. The bond may a certificate showing the cargo has been landed at its port of destination. The status of liquor ships alleged to have the intention of smuggling liquor into a United States port, and putting into Canadian ports, will be considerably altered under the new provision.
