The two governments propose to spend jointly five million dollars over a period of ten years in establishing these youthful settlers. After they have been given the necessary preliminary training and have worked for wages for a sufficiently long time to save approximately \$500. each of them will have an advance made to him of \$2,500 for the acquiring of land, stock and equipment. Before this is done, however, he will have to have reached the age of twenty-one. They have to be between fourteen and twenty, on their arrival, armi are to undertake to repay the money expended for their benefit, though it is not stated how

The plan has large possibilities and with proper administration will be the means of making a very valuable addition to our citizenship. The co-opera tion of the provincial authorities is looked for and it will depend upon the extent to which this is given how many of the boys will be allotted to each pro situate at the head of the south arm of vince. LONDON OPINION
