## Story of Their Escape Watery Grave Related by Men from Kiltuish

AFTER BOAT STRUCK, THEY MANAGED TO MAKE SHORE WHERE THEY LIVED FOUR DAYS ON HALIBUT-DROWNED MAN BURIED

Seven members of the crew of the Canadian halibut boat Kiltuish, which went ashore about eighty miles from Yakutat, arrived from Ketchikan and will seek new berths on other boats as soon as

While not minimizing any of the hardships which they were called upon to endure from the time the boat hit until they were later picked up by the American fishing schooner Irene after being stranded for four days, during which time they lived on halibut

which had been washed ashore from the wrecked craft, they look upon their experience as part of the game and are ready to put out again at the first JAPAN GLOOMY

Members of the crew, when seen this norning, said that, in addition to the heavy snow storm, there was also a very heavy sea running at the time and the craft which hit about a mile from shore, was tossed about as a cork mountainous seas sweeping over her and tearing everything loose.

After nearly three hours of struggling to stay with the ship which was all the time being driven closer to shore some of the crew were washed over board and, with the greatest difficulty, were able to make shore. Jock Low, cook, and an expert swimmer, made shore after a desperate struggle and, when the engineer who was seeking to take a line ashore was nearly overcome, Low went to his assistance. On this line, which hung in the water, the other members of the crew were able to make shore, taking advantage of the heavy swells as they rolled toward the beach. WHOLE MONEY STRUCTURE OF COUNTRY UNCERTAIN FOLLOW-ING FAILURE OF BIG CON-

LONDON, April 9 .- Tokio despatches say that, pending successful adjustment of the affairs of the Suzuki Co., which suspended this week with liabilities of \$250,000,000, the entire financial structure of Japan is thrown into uncertainty.
