Notice is hereby given that, pursuant to sub-section (3) of Section 52B of the Taxation Act, every person who engages in, carries on, or practices any Trade, Business or Profession within the Province is required to obtain from the Commissioner of Income Tax a Certificate of Registration before April 30th, 1927. Application should be made to any Provincial Assessor, from whom full information may be obtained. Certificates will be issued without the payment of any fee therefor.

Default in complying with the provisions of this section renders the person liable, upon summary conviction, to a fine of \$10.00 for each day during which his default continues.

Application forms may be obtained from any Provincial Assessor, Government Agent, Provincial Police Officer, or from the Commissioner of Income Tax, Victoria, B.C.

DETERMINED TO FLY ATLANTIC

FRENCH AVIATORS PREPARING TO MAKE THE NON-STOP CROSSING.

PARIS, April 14.—Captain Charles Nungesser, one of France's best known aviators, and Captain Francis Coli are determined to be the first flyers to try a non-stop flight from Paris to New York in the hope of winning the \$25,000 prize offered for the feat by Raymond Orteig, of New York. They have decided to start some time during the first two weeks of May.

While their plane is being perfected the two airmen have gone into training with all the thoroughness of boxers before a championship bout. They will use a Le Vasseur plane with a 450 horsepower Torraine engine fitted with a kind of change speed gear which, it is claimed, facilitates taking off and makes it possible to get all available power out of the engine with the least consumption of gasoline.

The body of the machine is constructed in such a way that it will float long enough to await help should it fall into the sea. It will carry gasoline and oil enough for a flight of 45 hours, which is more than adequate for the task even against head winds.

Captain Nungesser had a distinguished aviation career in the world war, when he brought down about forty German planes. He began planning a Paris-New York flight as far back as 1922.

Captain Coli has cherished transatlantic flight ambitions for several years. In September 1925, his plane which was intended for a flight to New York was demolished in an accident.

LIBRARY BOARD HAS REGULAR MEETING

Routine Business Transacted at Directors' Gathering Last Night

The regular monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert public library board was held last night. Those present were the president, G. V. Wilkinson, James Black, George Sutherland and Rev. G. G. Haeker, secretary.

The librarian's report showed sixty-two new borrowers enrolled during the month of March with 22 cards cancelled, or a net increase of forty. Books received by gift totalled 24 and by purchase, 43. Eleven books were discarded making the total on hand at the end of the month 5,764. There were 4,752 books circulated during the month, classified as follows: fiction, 1303; non-fiction, 520; juvenile 929. The library was open twenty-two days and the average daily circulation of books was 216. A set of Books of Knowledge is now being supplied to replace one that was worn out.

A great need is felt for new books but, until the city estimates are passed, the board must proceed slowly.
