

OTTAWA, April 14 .- The Indians of British Columbia have not established any claims to lands in that province upon aboriginal or other titles, the parliamentary committee. which investigated the matter, has found. The report of the committee. which was considered in the Senate vesterday, cites an order-in-council passed in 1914 providing reference to the claims of the natives to the Exchequer Court of Canada with the right to appeal to the Privy Council.
