They can't seem to keep on their feet! That seems to be the only trouble with John Bull's heavyweight boxers. Most of them seem to be afflicted with sleeping sickness just as soon as an opponent starts tickling their jaws with a glove. Take Joe Becker for instance. He probably set a record for being flattened. He went down so often and so quickly that "it got to be a standing joke. Now comes Phil Scott, another British "hope." He looked like a million dollars in training but when he got in the ring against Knute Hansen recently in New York he looked like thirty cents. Phil was knocked down six times in the first round and then led out to hear the birdies sing. All England is getting "hot up" and a sporting weekly in London has started an agitation to prevent the big "hopes" from crossing the Atlantic until they have been O.K'd by competent judges. Eugene Corri, noted British referee, declares "British heavyweights have no brains."

The same ring in which the late Tiger Flowers made his New York debut also was the scene of the last fight in his colorful boxing career during which the Georgia deacon, former middleweight champion of the world, earned around a half million dollars. In his first Gotham fight, Flowers started against Lee Anderson, a light heavyweight, and knocked him out in the fifth round. His last fight was against Leo Gates, a heavyweight from whom he won by the knockout route in the fourth round in the same ring. It is estimated that Flowers earned half a million dollars during seven years in the ring, not deducting expenses and other details involved in about 200 matches. Since losing his title to Walker last December, Flowers had competed against 19 opponents. Flowers was the only negro who held the middleweight championship. He was very religious and a deacon of the Baptist Church in his home town. Before the operation, Flowers made a will bequeathing property valued at \$100,000 to his wife and a six-year old daughter.

CANNOT RECOVER A DEBT ON FUR COAT SOLD TO THE WIFE

MONTREAL, Nov. 24.—A judgment of considerable importance to merchants who sell fur coats to women on the installment plan has been rendered by Mr. Justice Albert de Lorimier who, in dismissing an action taken by Cohen's, Limited, against Dame Charlotte Tessier et vir, made it clear that, unless the husband signs the contract, a purchase of this kind made by the wife is not valid and no action can be taken to recover the balance of the purchase price after failure of the purchaser to pay instalments.

A wife, the judge pointed out, may contribute her share to a household, but she has no assets which can be liquidated. And even if she had liquid assets, His Lordship added, they must be placed as her contribution in the hands of her husband and she cannot assume an obligation on the strength of them. The action was therefore dismissed, with costs.
