Sankey Case Discussed in Court View to a Possible Change of Venue and Then Is Adjourned

J. Edward Bird, counsel for Joseph Sankey, charged with and once convicted of the murder of Miss Loretta Chisholm, pretty young school teacher, at Port Essington on May 23, 1926, renewed his efforts at the session of the Supreme Court Assizes here yesterday afternoon to have the trial removed to a venue other than this one. He based his application on the grounds of prejudice prevailing here against accused, citing in support of his claim newspaper reports pertaining to the case which he held were prejudicial, unfair, and, in some cases, incorrect.
