CHOICE OF YOUNG PEOPLE

The young people of the United Church have chosen Ralph Connor as the novelist who has made the greatest imprint on the character of Canadians individually and as a nation. Over 100,000 took part in the vote. Pauline Johnson is chosen as the greatest poet and John Redpath Dougall the greatest editor.
Dr. Charles Gordon who writes under the name of Ralph Connor and who is also moderately well known as a Presbyterian clergyman who has since joined the United Church of Canada and who for many years preached at St. Stephen's, Winnipeg, to a congregation of intellectuals, including many of the professors of the University of Manitoba, generally uses religious themes for his books and he glorifies the Scottish Highlanders of Ontario. He always introduces a fist fight or a shinty match or some other physical struggle in which the passions of men are aroused and the hero wins. Also he rather glorifies the influence of the Presbyterian clergy.

DR. DOUGALL, OF THE WITNESS

Dr. Dougall, editor of the Witness, is an example of a man who like Frank Oliver of Edmonton, has made good while being a financial failure. The Daily Witness, over the destinies of which he presided, went under. It could not survive the changing conditions and mode of thought of the younger generation. Yet Dr. Dougall has kept on the weekly paper and made it a power in the land, through its strong leading articles. One of his associates writing of him is reported to have said:

His forward look, prowess and production are the wonder of all who know him. His cold morning shower and his three-mile walk to business are ample evidence of his physical robustness. The Witness editorial pages testify that his mind is alert and clear, his sympathies are wide and keen, his spirit is strong and adventurous. With all his eighty-six years, he is living for the rising generation who have, through the voice of young people's organizations, so honored him."

HOW LIBERALS WON ELECTION

Program Issued by Party in Prince Edward Island Similar to Conservatives

CHARLOTTETOWN, P.E.I., June 28.—While the election of the Liberals in this province at the week-end was brought about largely by the anti-liquor sentiment of the people, the Liberals also had an extensive program which they promised to bring about if elected. It included further pressing of the island's claims for increased Federal subsidy, and promises on obtaining the same to have a downward revision of taxation.
The agricultural planks of the Saunders' platform includes the promotion of co-operative efforts among farming, the encouragement of the use of pure bred and improved stock, a wider advertisement of the fact that Prince Edward Island is a disease free area, the promotion of horse breeding, of the growing of small fruits, and of testing the feasibility of establishing a canning industry, and generally to promote agricultural education.

With respect to the fisheries, it advocates the opening up of new and better markets, the securing of better transportation facilities, and the acting in co-operation with the Dominion government with a view of re-establishing the oyster beds of this province.

So far as education is concerned, it promises to continue the policy of assisting and promoting all branches, and also is in favor of appointing three additional normal trained school inspectors and increase the efficiency of the schools by a more thorough inspection system.

ROAD POLICY

The reorganization of the system of road work, whereby the island will be divided into sections; the continuation of the policy of constructing permanent works, and restoration of the highways to the original standard of efficiency are also planks in Mr. Saunders' platform.

If revenues permit, the Old Age Pension Act will be established on the island.

Another Liberal plank is that there shall be a payment of an equitable portion of the railways grant, in lieu of taxation, to Charlottetown and the incorporated towns in which the railway property is situated.

The Liberal policy on prohibition is as follows:

(1) The Liberal party will stand by and adhere to the prohibition law with such amendments as may be deemed necessary to make its administration more workable. Also a reduction will be made in the sale price of liquors for medicinal purposes.

(2) Appointment of three prohibition prosecutors for each county.
(3) Co-operation with the federal authorities for the enforcement of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act to prevent smuggling of liquor and illicit stills.

Amendments—(a) Appointment of three magistrates with exclusive jurisdiction for enforcing the Prohibition Act.
(b) Reduction in the price of certificates issued by physicians in prescribing liquors for medicinal purposes.

Plebiscite—In the month of July, 1929, after amendments are made, the following plebiscite will be submitted to the electors, and the wish of the majority shall prevail: "Are you in favor of retaining the Prohibition Act?" "Are you in favor of government control of the sale of liquors?"

The campaign was featured by the activity shown by the Temperance Alliance in favor of prohibition. Many meetings were held under the auspices of that organization, and in addition to local speakers, Rev. Dr. Murdoch MacKinnon of Toronto, Mrs. Gordon Wright, President of the Canadian W.C.T.U., Rev. H. R. Grant, of New Glasgow, Rev. John Coburn, of Toronto, assistant secretary of the Social Service Department of the United States and Canada; Rev. Archibald Sutherland of Fredericton, general secretary of the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance, Rev. R. H. E. Thomas of Sackville; Mrs. H. P. Newcombe, of Halifax, also spoke at different points throughout the island.

HOLLYWOOD, June 29.—How a stitch in time helped to win \$1,000 is the tale of Mrs. Edna Hagney, petite wife of Frank Hagney, who won the recent skiff race across the Catalina Channel over practically the same 25-mile course made famous by George Young, who won the Wm. Wrigley swimming prize of \$25,000.
Like Betsy Ross, Mrs. Hagney sewed before the battle. But this time it wasn't a flag, but a patch on the seat of hubby's trousers.
"Frank built a special boat with a sliding seat," Mrs. Hagney explained, "but the race committee ruled there must be no sliding seats. So just before the race I sewed a leather patch on the seat of Frank's trousers, and he put on some of that famous channel grease which the swimmers used. You should have seen him slide."
