VANCOUVER, January 12 .- To save British Columbia liquor exporters from prosecution following recent disclosures at the Vancouver session of the customs commission, it has been decided to operate under a flag other than British. "This action," says the Vancouver Province, "has been suggested as a result of a decision taken by the owners of the motorship Principio, well known liquor carrying vessel, whose registry has been transferred from Canada to Gautemala.
